Statewide Summary – Only a few counties are reporting precipitation at this time. All precipitation is being reported as rain at this time. Pavement conditions are being reported as wet. There have been a few isolated reports of icy bridges. These isolated areas are being addressed by maintenance crews. SCDOT forces will be working continuously on rotating 12-hour shifts applying salt and other anti-icing/deicing materials throughout the storm. Sixteen crews have been deployed from the low country to the upstate to assist with snow removal operations. Statewide, roadways are in good shape at this time.

Engineering District 1 (Kershaw, Lee, Lexington, Richland, and Sumter Counties) –Temperatures in District One are ranging between 28 and 34 degrees. Rain is being reported Sumter and cloudy in four counties. Pavement is currently being reported as wet. Crews and equipment are actively treating and pretreating bridges and roads on a priority basis.

Engineering District 2 (Abbeville, Anderson, Edgefield, Greenwood, Laurens, McCormick, Newberry, and Saluda Counties) –Temperatures in District Two are ranging between 24 and 34 degrees. The District is reporting cloudy conditions throughout with the exception of rain in Edgefield County. Priority routes and bridges are being pretreated in all counties with the exception Greenwood who is on stand-by. Pavement is currently being reported as wet.

Engineering District 3 (Greenville, Oconee, Pickens, and Spartanburg Counties) –Temperatures in District Three are ranging between 28 to 33 degrees. Priority routes and bridges have been pretreated and we are continuing to monitor and treat them as necessary. Pavement is currently being reported as wet.

Engineering District 4 (Cherokee, Chester, Chesterfield, Fairfield, Lancaster, Union, and York Counties) – Temperatures in District Four are ranging between 28 and 31 degrees. All counties are reporting road conditions as wet. Priority routes and bridges continue to be pretreated.

Engineering District 5 (Darlington, Dillon, Florence, Georgetown, Horry, Marion, Marlboro, and Williamsburg Counties) – Temperatures in District Five are ranging between 27 and 34 degrees. Road conditions are being reported as wet. Pavement temperatures are being monitored and anti-icing operations are ongoing as warranted.

Engineering District 6 (Beaufort, Berkeley, Charleston, Colleton, Dorchester, and Jasper Counties) – Temperatures in District Six are ranging between 32 and 34 degrees. Weather conditions are being reported as rainy or cloudy. Pavement conditions are reported as wet. Maintenance crews have begun placing brine to pretreat bridges and overpasses along I-26 and I-95 in Colleton, Dorchester, and Berkeley Counties and other priority routes as necessary. Jasper and Beaufort counties are not in operation at this time.

The Ravenel Bridge is open and the surface is wet. Lowest recorded surface temperature on the Ravenel Bridge was 34 degrees at 10:59 PM. Began pre-treating Ravenel Bridge with brine mix at 9:15 p.m.

Engineering District 7 (Aiken, Allendale, Bamberg, Barnwell, Calhoun, Clarendon, Hampton, and Orangeburg Counties) – Temperatures in District Seven are ranging between 32 and 34 degrees. Roads are being reported as wet. Crews and equipment are prepared to respond as the temperatures warrant.

Conditions of roads and bridges are deteriorating rapidly. With temperatures falling statewide this morning most roads will remain hazardous throughout the morning. STATE EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER STATUS:

The South Carolina Emergency Management Division and members of the State Emergency Response Team activated the South Carolina Emergency Operations Center (SEOC) at Operation Condition 3 (OpCon 3) at noon on Tuesday, February 11 in response to severe winter weather. The SEOC will remain activated for the duration of this event.

SITUATION:

A winter storm moved into South Carolina during the afternoon on Tuesday, February 11 dropping snow, sleet, and freezing rain across most of the State. The conditions are expected to worsen throughout the day with as much as 10 inches of snow in the upstate and 1 inch of ice accumulating in the midlands. State offices are closed for the day in 41 counties and delayed in 2 others.

- The South Carolina Department of Transportation has crews pushing snow and treating roads throughout the state while monitoring the conditions of roadways and bridges. Conditions on many roadways are extremely hazardous. The Ravenel Bridge, Stono Bridge, and Limehouse Bridges in Charleston have been closed due to ice accumulation. Also closed are the McKinley Bridge in Edisto and the MLK Bridge in Florence (closed by Florence County). SCDOT has 1,065 maintenance employees and 402 pieces of equipment actively involved in road operations. Crews have used 2,929 tons of salt, 705 tons of sand, 6,782 gallons of calcium chloride, and 728,267 gallons of salt brine since the incident began.
- The South Carolina Highway Patrol has sent additional personnel to impacted areas, including resources from the State Law Enforcement Division and the Department of Natural Resources. Over the last operational period, 354 officers responded to 27 abandoned vehicles, 108 motorist assists, 95 collisions, 3 trees in roadway, and 1 traffic hazard. These numbers are not above normal.
- 102 S.C. National Guard soldiers are standing by to assist first responders and state agencies should additional support be needed. 14 wreckers are assisting highway patrol as needed and the JOC is operational.
- The only communications issue reported is in the Long Mountain area in Oconee County. 40 portable 800 MHz radios have been issued to the National Guard to support response operations.

- Over 4,500 power outages are being reported mostly in the Aiken area. Utility crews are working to resolve the issues.
- The Red Cross has approximately 100 employees and volunteers assigned to the Winter Storm. There are six Emergency Response Vehicles assigned throughout the state to support operations. There are no current operational shortfalls identified. As of 0700 02/12/14 there are six general population shelters and two warming centers open. Media reports indicate jurisdiction warming centers open in Columbia, Bennettsville, and Marion. These city warming centers have not been reported through EMD channels. As of 0001 02/12/14 no residents have been reported.

Today: Sleet before 10am, then freezing rain. High near 30. Northeast wind 15 to 17 mph. Chance of precipitation is 100%. Total daytime ice accumulation of 0.4 to 0.6 of an inch possible. Total daytime sleet accumulation of less than a half inch possible.

Tonight: Freezing rain before 4am, then freezing drizzle. Low around 29. North wind 11 to 15 mph. Chance of precipitation is 100%. New ice accumulation of 0.3 to 0.5 of an inch possible.

Today: Snow. The snow could be heavy at times. High near 28. Northeast wind 14 to 18 mph, with gusts as high as 30 mph. Chance of precipitation is 100%. Total daytime snow accumulation of 3 to 7 inches possible.

At 7:30 a.m. this morning, Governor Haley held an executive group conference call with the South Carolina Emergency Management Division, Department of Transportation, Department of Public Safety, National Guard Office of Regulatory Staff, and the State Climatologist. The Governor was briefed on the latest forecasts for different regions throughout the state, road and bridge conditions statewide, power outages statewide, and agency needs in response to emergency operations. As of this morning, there were no unmet needs by state agencies.

Power Outages:

- SCE&G – 4,763 outages at 7:30 a.m.; 10,000 outages as of 8:30 a.m.
- Duke Energy – 1 outage as of 7:00 a.m.; 550 outages as of 8:15 a.m.
- Aiken Electric (Coops) – 1,000 outages early this morning when a power substation temporarily dropped; all have since been restored.

Road Conditions:

- Snowfall has begun to accumulate 1-3 inches with varying amounts throughout the state. Freezing rain has been reported in both the upper and lower areas of the state. Therefore, conditions of roads and bridges are deteriorating rapidly.
- Travel is not recommended unless absolutely necessary.

RAVENEL BRIDGE - At 4:30 a.m., it was reported that the Ravenel Bridge has been closed due to icy conditions. Charleston has been treating the Ravenel Bridge with brine mix since 9:15 p.m. last night and started treating with granular salt this morning at approximately 3:45 a.m.

ROAD CONDITIONS - Precipitation is beginning to move back into the state at this time. Much of the precipitation shown on the weather radar is not reaching the ground. Some of the precipitation is being reported as freezing rain and snow, but most counties with precipitation are reporting rain. Pavement conditions are being reported as wet in most counties.

COUNTY CLOSINGS - Oconee County has announced it will be closed today. Other Upstate counties, Abbeville and Greenwood, have yet to announce. Some counties still remain open for the day (Colleton, Jasper, Beaufort), but Charleston has announced it will close today.

Most counties, with the exception of coastal areas and the southern part of District Seven, have roads and bridges covered with snow and ice. Crews in all Districts except District 6 are currently plowing interstates and primary routes with all available snow plows. Engineering District 7 (Aiken, Allendale, Bamberg, Barnwell, Calhoun, Clarendon, Hampton, and Orangeburg Counties) – Temperatures in District Seven are ranging between 30 and 34 degrees. The weather is cloudy and rainy in most counties with Bamberg reporting freezing rain. Roads are being reported as wet or partially covered with snow/ice. Interstates, priority routes, and bridges continue to be treated as needed with anti-icing materials and equipment. Most counties in this District are reporting a significant number of fallen trees and vegetative debris.

SCDOT Headquarters - The Director of Maintenance office will be staffed throughout this weather event. Heavy salt deliveries have been made this morning throughout District 7 with some deliveries to the Columbia salt dome. The SCDOT Call Center will be staffed from 7:00 AM till 5:00 PM Thursday, February 13. Routes will be cleared in the following priorities:

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
