Last October, Phil Wilson, a 68 year old man with Medicare, went to his doctor's office for a visit. During the visit, he was approached by a pharmacist working with his doctor that asked if he wanted help selecting a Medicare Part D Prescription Drug Plan (PDP) for 2017. The pharmacist explained that Medicare offers enrollment into plans every fall for the upcoming year to help pay for prescription medications. At the time of his visit, he had recently been diagnosed with cancer and was having difficulty affording his new medications.

I am a caregiver with my husband, David, taking care of my 92 year old mother for over 10 years. About seven years ago, she was diagnosed as incompetent and my niece was named her Trustee. Currently I take care of my mother approximately 525 hours plus a month. My niece and I had an agreement that I would get one weekend a month to go and see my sons. Now she want me to pay for her care during this time off. This is causing me a lot of stress and I don't know what to do or if I do have any rights at all. She has threatened to kick me out several times and keeps increasing my responsibilities.

There is one thing that really bothers me. My niece says she can do whatever she wants and no one can do anything about it. Is this statement true? I ask this because there are other issues that are going on that should be addressed. I have heard about community meditation. Is this something that could help me?
