With that in mind, we must work together for meaningful reform in higher education funding. We have reached a critical threshold:

- Wild funding disparities now exist between our state universities with the amounts arbitrarily appropriated to each university loosely related to SC resident enrollments and missions.
- Constrained revenues and unstable economic conditions make it unrealistic the General Assembly can restore the 50 plus percent of direct state support lost by higher education over the last decade.
- Unpopular tuition and fee increases are not a long-term remedy to remain competitive in the higher education marketplace. This unfortunate situation no longer serves the interests of our state's taxpayers, parents or students.

Reform— through performance, transparency, accountability and affordability metrics - can be a large part of the solution in providing critical and necessary state support for public higher education. With our successful students, faculty, alumni and staff, I am confident we can demonstrate and deliver results, making USC a worthy continued investment in South Carolina's future.

Again, thank you for your leadership and support. There are many bright opportunities for our great state of South Carolina, and I look forward to working with you to make them a reality.
