We are currently in the process of installing more informational waysides on the grounds that about tenant families and more. Most of our interpretation is shared through our tours inside the home, which are currently self-guided. There are several text panels that educate visitors on slavery (highlighting specific examples of those enslaved on the plantation), the Reconstruction era and Jim Crow. While the topic maybe controversial and uncomfortable for some, sharing the experiences of those who were enslaved is very important to understanding our history. We invite you to this historic site to walk the grounds and learn more about those who resided there.
