Washington Post: South Carolina's Haley pitches education reform package

South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley (R) will propose spending \$160 million on new education programs aimed at low-income children and those learning to speak English, a modest move toward an ambitious education reform package Haley laid out early in her term but has yet to complete. Haley's proposal, delivered Wednesday before a group of lawmakers and educators in West Columbia, S.C., would provide an extra \$97 million in funding for schools in the poorest school districts.

Note: "The big bear in the room is K through 12, and it's the one thing we have to focus on if we are going to continue to be successful in bringing these highly technical jobs to the state," Haley said. Too often, she said, students are being promoted past third grade without being able to read.

Gov. Nikki Haley unveiled details of her K-12 Education Reform Initiative Wednesday, which includes funding for children living in poverty, reading coach programs and technology improvements. Haley met with 16 different groups of teachers, administrators, business leaders, education stakeholders and members of the state's General Assembly over the past year to develop the plan, according to a news release from the governor's office.

Note: "Providing every child in South Carolina with the same educational opportunities isn't just something we should talk about — it's something we should be actively fighting to achieve, and that is what we are doing today," Haley said in a statement.

Legislators say they want to see changes in the way the state Department of Transportation is structured and functions before they will support any massive funding increase on roads and bridges. Among those who want to see some change is Rep. Brian White, an Anderson Republican and chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, who said he will take a "hard look" at DOT funding this year. Some rural lawmakers say rural roads are not getting enough priority, while others think the DOT structure set up by reforms in 2007 is not working.

Using the Freedom of Information Act, WSPA News Channel 7 combed through more than 5,000 emails from staff at the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control starting with the first ones sent after learning of a patient with tuberculosis in Greenwood County until parents at Ninety Six Primary School were notified of the outbreak. The first red flags come March 12th when nine D-HEC employees are warned of a "TB suspect" at "Ninety Six Primary School". It would be three months before parents were notified.

Uninsured smokers in South Carolina can get free nicotine replacement therapy from the Department of Health and Environmental Control, state health officials announced today. Moving quickly to contain a widening political scandal, Gov. Chris Christie fired one of his top aides Thursday and apologized repeatedly for the "abject stupidity" of his staff, insisting he had no idea anyone around him had engineered traffic jams to get even with a Democratic mayor. Christie, who had previously assured the public that his staff had nothing to do with the lane closings in September that caused major backups at the George Washington Bridge, said he fired Deputy Chief of Staff Bridget Anne Kelly "because she lied to me" when he demanded weeks ago that anyone who knew anything about the episode come forward.

President Barack Obama is still grappling with key decisions on the future of the National Security Agency's phone collection program and the makeup of the secret court that approved the surveillance, congressional lawmakers said Thursday following a 90-minute meeting at the White House. Obama is expected to back tighter restrictions on foreign leader spying and also is considering a presidential commission's recommendation to strip the NSA of its ability to store telephone records from millions of Americans. The president could announce his final decisions as early as next week.
