Shelton Vineyards | Dodson, NC

Oh, Divine Wine

The back story of the proliferation of vineyards in the Yadkin Valley of North Carolina is two-fold. First, there is the land – verdant and rolling, with terroir that invites the grapes to sing. Many of these fields were formerly tobacco farms, and with smoking on the decline, a new crop had to be found. Enter the much-loved grape.

Second, the area supported its new crop. Folks worked together and the word got out. Surry Community College developed a two-year curriculum. Oenophiles began to taste, awards were won, and the rest is history.

Today, you can visit more than 100 wineries in the state, with many in the Yadkin Valley. Start with Shelton Vineyards, the state's largest family-owned vineyard and the product of two brothers, Charlie and Ed Shelton, who grew up in the area. They remain some of the area's most ardent supporters, and their winery offers a perfect way to spend the afternoon.

First, you'll want to take a tour. The vineyards are beautiful, and if

you book the Winemaker Tour, you'll be escorted by their chief winemaker, Gill Giese. You'll learn about the process, and sample wines along the way. You'll stop in at Harvest Grill for a light bite and you'll leave with a complimentary crystal wine glass (and several bottles of your favorite wine). More options include the Reserve Indulgence Tasting and Gazebo Tasting. It's all good.

WOW Factor: These folks are winning awards at international wine competitions as well as in North Carolina. Make sure you sample their bestsellers: Yadkin Valley Riesling (semi-sweet and very flavorful) and Cabernet Sauvignon 2013, which won double gold at the NC State Competition.

Hint: Indulge responsibly and book a room at the Hampton Inn at Shelton Vineyards. (It's the only hotel in the group that features a wine bar.) Plan to dine at the Harvest Grill. Their menu changes seasonally, but you can count on creative pairings and options for both vegetarians and meat-lovers, including Cornbread Crab Cakes, Filet Mignon with black pepper gastrique, or Angel Hair Pasta Provencale. Consider the sides, too. Good stuff, especially when paired with the perfect vintage. www.sheltonvineyards.com

The man's Carolina roots are shallow, but we'll claim him anyway. Born in 1917 in Rocky Mount, North Carolina, in 1922, Thelonius moved with his family to West 63rd Street in Manhattan. He began to play piano at six and was largely self-taught. A high school dropout, he began to find work in jazz clubs in his late teens and developed quite a following during his years as house pianist at Minton's Playhouse, a Manhattan nightclub.

A contemporary of Dizzy Gillespie (another Carolina musician). Kenny Clarke, Charlie Parker and Miles Davis, Thelonius is considered a founder of bebop, although his style evolved away from that sound, and settled into remarkable improvisations that stunned listeners and all who would try to copy his work.

His later years were haunted by whispers of mental illness, and he largely relied on the support of Baroness Pannonica "Nica" de Koenigswarter, a member of the Rothschild family and a patroness of several New York City jazz musicians. He had a number of run-ins with police over illegal drugs and quit performing for years before his death. Thelonius Monk was married and had two children, both living.

The Thelonius Monk Institute of Jazz was established in 1986 by the Monk family and Maria Fisher. It offers public school-based jazz education programs for young people around the globe, helping students develop imaginative thinking, creativity, curiosity, a positive self-image, and a respect for their own and others' cultural heritage. Through its partnership with UNESCO, the Institute also helped to establish April 30 as International Jazz Day.

Monk was inducted into the North Carolina Music Hall of Fame in 2009.

Early recordings of live performances of his most notable work can be enjoyed on YouTube, which also showcases his love of hats and sunglasses.

Phillip Simmons 1912-2009

The Poet of Ironwork

He was born on Daniel Island, near Mount Pleasant, SC and, during his early years, was raised there by his grandparents. When he was eight, he was sent to Charleston to live with his mother.

Intrigued by the ironwork young Philip noticed during his walks to and from school, he began visiting blacksmith shops. He

learned the craft from Peter Simmons (a former slave) and eventually worked with him in his shop.

Philip Simmons was the most famous, respected ironworker in Charleston and as his work evolved, his pieces became more ornamental, adorning homes and businesses throughout the area.

During his career, he created more than 500 pieces of ornamental wrought iron, gates, balconies and more.

In 1982, the National Endowment for the Arts awarded him its National Heritage Fellowship. He received a lifetime achievement award from the SC state legislature, and in 1994, was awarded the Order of the Palmetto, the state's highest award.

His work has been acquired by the National Museum of American History, Smithsonian, Museum of International Folk Art and many international museums. He died at 97.

Today, visitors to Charleston can find his work on almost every corner. The Philip Simmons Foundation is working to preserve his legacy and his home has been opened as a museum. A gift shop offers items that are fashioned from his designs, and his work is being carried on by family members who learned their craft from him.

There is a tour available which shows visitors notable examples of his work. A documentary on his life, "Keeper of the Gate" won a 1995 Emmy Award. [Learn more.](#)
