Description:

Several atypical dementia syndromes may be confused with the more common diagnosis of Alzheimer's disease (AD). It is important to distinguish among these diagnoses because the management strategies that are effective in the care of adults with AD are often not effective with individuals with atypical dementias. Three of the most common of atypical dementia syndromes are as follows:

- **Vascular dementia** - cognitive deficits most often associated with vascular damage in

the brain, either micro or macro in nature.

- **Dementia with Lewy Bodies** - a dementia that also includes one or more of these core findings: recurrent and detailed visual hallucinations, Parkinsonian signs, and fluctuating changes in alertness or attention.
- **Frontotemporal dementia** - a disease often seen in individuals with onset of cognitive symptoms at a younger age; these individuals present most often with executive and language dysfunction and significant behavioral changes.
