In the FY 2013-14 budget, the General Assembly similarly appropriated \$100,000 to the Department of Health and Human Services for the Palmetto Project. I am vetoing that line this year because the organization has failed to meet basic the performance standards of the agreement they made with the Department.

With the funds earmarked for them in FY 2013-14, Palmetto Project was to develop a school-based strategy to ensure that eligible children are enrolled in Medicaid, working with enrollment data for the free and reduced-price lunch program in a handful of selected school districts.

Palmetto Project was to develop and pilot a toolkit that could be used across the state to support school-based enrollment best practices, however, they have been unable to develop this program and pilot it successfully. The reporting to the Department about the progress of the Palmetto Project's efforts has been incomplete and has not demonstrated credible evidence that the organization's school-based initiatives have improved enrollment for eligible but unenrolled children in the Medicaid program.

We don't need another year of this.
