## Obama administration tries to find homes for \$1.9B in 'orphaned' earmarks

USA Today: WASHINGTON — The Obama administration is freeing up \$1.9 billion in so-called "orphan" earmarks, five years after a USA TODAY investigation discovered that billions in highway funds authorized by Congress were stuck in a bureaucratic no man's land.

New guidance released by the U.S. Department of Transportation Tuesday allows states to move federal funds previously assigned to politically connected projects to other priorities. Because Congress had earmarked that money for specific pet projects in previous spending bills, only Congress could free up the money — which it did in the omnibus spending bill last year.

## **House Homeland Security Committee Finds 75 ISIS-Linked Plots Targeting West**

**Homeland Security Today:** The Islamic State of Iraq and the Levant (ISIS) has been tied to at least 75 terrorism plots against Western countries, with the United States as the group's main target, according to a recent report by the House Committee on Homeland Security.

The Committee's report, "Terrorism Gone Viral," revealed a significant increase in terrorist plots against the West over the past several years. In 2014 there were 19 ISIS-linked plots against the West; in 2015, the figure more than doubled to 48. The high success rate—with more than 40 percent of total plots executed—indicates that the group will likely continue to initiate frequent attacks, versus long-term plots.

## **Veil of secrecy lifted on Pentagon office planning 'Avatar' fighters and drone swarms**

**The Washington Post:** High over Alaska last summer, the Pentagon experimented with new, secret prototypes: Micro-drones that can be launched from the flare dispensers of moving F-16s and F/A-18 fighter jets. Canisters containing the tiny aircraft descended from the jets on parachutes before breaking open, allowing wings on each drone to swing out and catch the wind. Inch-wide propellers on the back provided propulsion as they found one another and created a swarm.

## **ISIS leader possibly killed in U.S. strike**

**CNN:** The U.S. military and intelligence community is assessing whether a targeted U.S. airstrike killed a top ISIS leader, known as Omar "the Chechen," several U.S. officials told CNN.

Abu Omar al-Shishani, the ISIS leader targeted in the strike, has a reputation as one of ISIS' most capable commanders. There has been a \$5 million reward on his head from the U.S. State Department. Shishani is a former member of an elite Georgian military unit.

### **CMS wants to change Part B drug payments**
