## Motorcyclist dies after Chapin crash

A motorcyclist is dead after a crash in Chapin on Saturday evening.

Christian Kallenbach, 49, of Chapin was the driver who died, according to Lexington County Coroner Margaret Fisher, who said Kallenbach was pronounced dead at the scene.

Kallenbach was traveling south on the 3000 block of Wessinger Road, near Dillon, S.C., when he lost control of his motorcycle, according to the S.C. Highway Patrol. The wreck happened at about 8:30 p.m.

Tance Cpl. Judd Jones said Kallenbach wasn't wearing a helmet. An autopsy will be performed on Monday.

The Highway Patrol continues to investigate.
