Island Packet: Haley confident in re-election bid at Hilton Head Island stop

Gov. Nikki Haley's statewide bus tour made two stops Friday in Beaufort County, part of a final push to rally voters before Tuesday's election. A boisterous crowd of about 200 supporters got an early start to chant and cheer for the incumbent Republican at 8 a.m. at the Hilton Head Island Republican Club office on Mathews Drive.

Note: "I know the polls are in our favor right now, but polls don't vote," Haley said. "Let's make sure we're not leaving it up to chance."

Note: "The Technical College (of the Lowcountry) is a shining star," she said. "A lot of these jobs are not university-degree jobs. They pay well; they've got great benefits. They're \$70,000- to \$80,000-a-year jobs, but we just need about 12 months of technical-school training."

Note: Haley vowed to continue to "work hard to make you proud, to make sure your children have a better education and make sure our towns and rural areas continue to thrive and show that growing up in Bamberg means something."

All South Carolina voters will decide two amendments Tuesday regarding lotteries and the process for choosing the leader of the state's military. Neither amendment has drawn much controversy or publicity, and only Amendment 2 has triggered much political activity.

Note: Gov. Nikki Haley urged voters to approve the change during a stop in Summerville this week.

Note: "We are the only state in the country that still elects our adjutant general. That is my right hand person. That is who manages our National Guard. This is who manages our Emergency Management Division," she said. "We can't leave that up to chance. Years ago, we had a pharmacist that ran for that position. We love pharmacists but they don't need to be running our military."

Lowcountry voting officials said Friday apparently was the busiest day so far as voters cast absentee ballots ahead of Tuesday's election. Statewide, more than 143,853 absentee ballots have been issued, with about 123,442 returned, the S.C. Election Commission said.

Note: In their first go-round four years ago, Republican Nikki Haley bested Democrat Vincent Sheheen by a 51-47 percent margin, or a difference of 60,000 votes. To improve their chances, Democrats must bump up their organization and turnout numbers now that Haley has the power of incumbency.

Note: He also wants to push for more funding for programs that help seniors live independently, noting that Gov. Nikki Haley vetoed \$2 million this year for those efforts, which include home-delivered meals. Legislators easily overrode the veto.

Note: McMaster emphasizes economic development and his ties with Haley, saying they would represent the first true executive office team.
