### Governor Nikki Haley News:

**The State:** Want to fix SC roads? A look at what you can do with an added \$400 million

That estimate removes costs for mass transit and new roads from the added \$1.5 billion a year that the transportation agency previously has estimated is needed to fix the state's crumbling roads through 2040, Hall told the annual S.C. Alliance to Fix Our Roads meeting.

**Note:** However, \$1.2 billion is nearly three times the roughly \$400 million a year that Republican Gov. Nikki Haley and S.C. House members have proposed to spend to fix the state's roads.

**Note:** Haley's lower cost proposal focuses on repairing the state's most heavily traveled roadways and bridges, said Hall, who is appointed by the governor.

The state's transportation chief says it would cost \$1.2 billion more in funding per year to do everything that is needed to fix the state's existing roads and bridges but she is giving lawmakers options to see what they would get if they spent hundreds of millions of dollars less.

**Note:** That's a new approach from that proposed over the past two years, in which the state Department of Transportation board used a long-term study to argue the system needed almost \$1.5 billion more a year and Gov. Nikki Haley responded by saying the state could get by with \$400 million more.
