Chamber President Ted Pitts said, “For Palmetto State businesses to grow and prosper, we have to take steps to make our state's climate more business friendly and competitive. We need to finish the job for our state's businesses and citizens who need safe roads and bridges to travel and move products. Finally, our current business licensing system is one of the most business unfriendly policies that our small businesses have to deal with.”

2017 Competitiveness Agenda

Fill the Workforce Pipeline

South Carolina's business community needs targeted strategies that will increase the number of people with the right skills in the talent pipeline:

- Apprenticeship participation growth

- Expansion of Career and Technology Education
- 0% State income tax rate for military retirement benefits
- Ex-offender workforce integration programs
- Tuition support for non-credit bearing State Licensed or Industry Recognized credentials for critical needs jobs
- Re-establishment of the Education and Economic Development Coordinating Council

Finish the Job on Roads

South Carolina's business community has consistently called for sustainable, long-term funding to fix, and maintain South Carolina's roads and bridges.

- Revenue options: remove the sales tax exemption on motor fuel; raise the sales tax exemption cap on vehicles; dedicate these funds directly to infrastructure

Cut the Red Tape on Business Licensing

South Carolina's small business community needs a standardized business licensing process that makes it easier to do business across the state.

- One form, one expiration date and the ability to file online through the Secretary of State

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
