TIDBIT! Winter has been mild, but even in colder years the Eastern Garter Snake is often the first snake to become active as spring approaches. This common reptile can vary in its darker background color but is easily identified by the yellowish stripe down the center of the back and the yellow sides. Garter Snakes most often are found in moist habitats and feed mainly on amphibians, earthworms, insects, and fish. Young are born live and can number over 50. Although non-venomous, Garter Snakes may first defend themselves by attempting to bite or emitting a foul musk if handled.
