A manufacturer of recycled tire material is planning to invest \$20 million in the Upstate, according to a release from Gov. Nikki Haley's office. Carbon Resources Recovery, CRR, intends to locate their first North American facility in Anderson County. The facility is expected to create 30 new jobs.
