The slaying of nine people at Charleston's Emanuel AME Church in June thrust Gov. Nikki Haley into the national spotlight. But Haley worked on the issue with lawmakers behind the scenes. By the Monday following the shooting, Haley, flanked by the state's top politicians, called on the Legislature to change the law and furl the flag permanently.

**Note:** Her decision helped unify members from both sides of the aisle of the Legislature. It also provided political cover for Republicans who worried about how their constituents would react to the change.

At an additional cost of \$1.8 million per year, it is difficult to envision a rationale for South Carolina to not improve its dam safety program in the wake of last fall's torrential rains that caused nearly three dozen dams to fail. A bill presented by South Carolina Speaker of the House Jay Lucas would nearly quadruple the budget for the program that's administered by the state Department of Health and Environmental Control, according to a report by The State newspaper.

**Note:** A spokeswoman for Gov. Nikki Haley acknowledged after the flood that there's a funding gap in the agency and said that there would likely be a more money for the program in the executive budget. That needs to happen.
