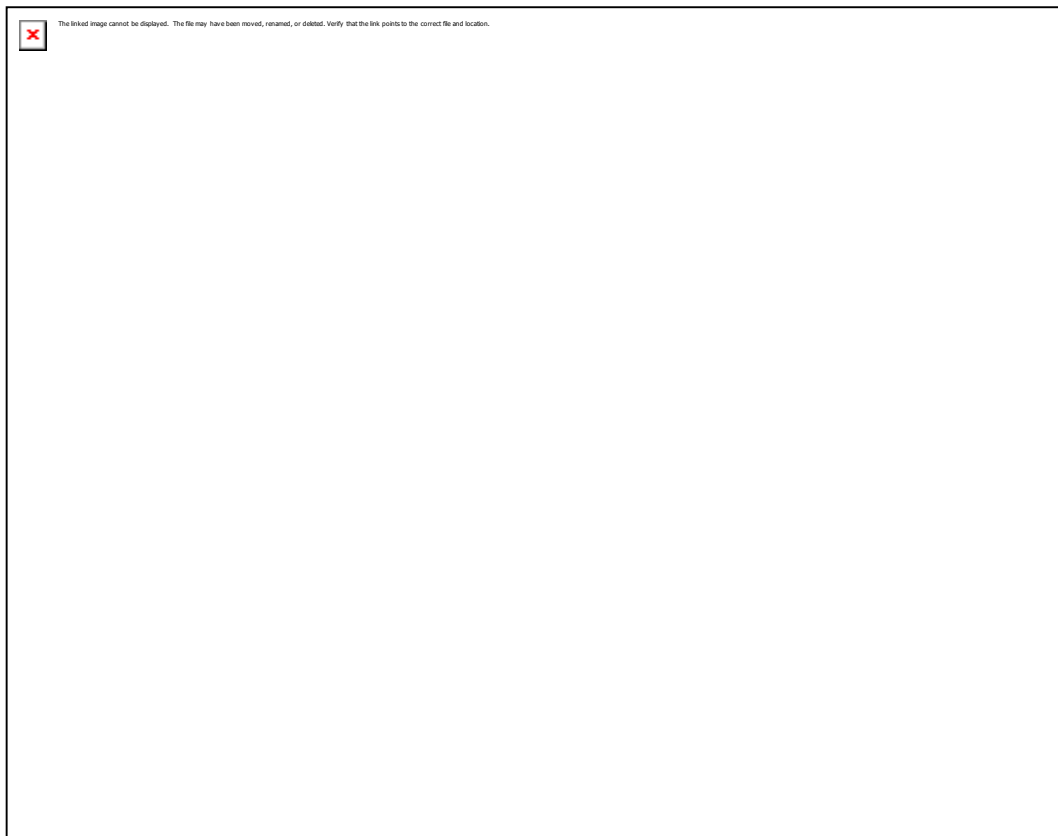

Subject: Weather Alert - Severe Thunderstorms

Strong thunderstorms develop late this afternoon ahead of a cold front to our west. Storm cells develop and intensify after 3 PM. Primary threat will be 40-50 mph wind gusts mixing down to the surface and lightning. Chance for tornadic activity is best to our north but cannot rule out one of the stronger cells showing some rotation later this afternoon. Most of the stronger cells fizzle after 9 PM with residual rainshowers and the aforementioned cold front sweeping languidly offshore mid-morning Tuesday. The Storm Prediction Center has put most of the State, and a good chunk of the Eastern Seaboard, at slight risk for severe storms. Images below.
