Thank you for taking the time to contact us. These have been very difficult times for South Carolina, but our hearts and minds remain fixed on the nine families and the communities shaken by this tragedy. Their grace and strength set a powerful example for us all.

Even in the midst of our grief, South Carolina set about the process of healing – not by talking about issues that divide us – but by hugging our neighbors, holding vigils, honoring those we lost, and falling to our knees in prayer. We came together as a state, as a unified people, to remember those we lost and to begin this healing process.

We've also come together in acknowledging that certain symbols and events of our past resonate differently among us. For some, the Confederate flag represents a history of their ancestry and heritage. For others, the flag is a deeply painful reminder of a brutally oppressive past.

Inspired by the victims' families and the re-opening of Emanuel A.M.E. church, I felt compelled to make a statement about moving the flag from the Statehouse grounds. This is a moment in which we can say that the flag, while an integral part of our past, does not represent the future of our great state, and that by removing a symbol that divides us, we can move forward as a state in harmony.

The time has come for us to set the flag among the other markers of our history so we can set our eyes on the great promise of a united South Carolina. God bless.

Apparently Governor Haley's staff is not familiar with the Federal laws granting a governor authority to lower the Flag of the United States. Governors of the several U.S. states or territories are authorized by federal law to order all U.S. and state flags in their jurisdiction flown at half-staff as a mark of respect for a former or current state official who has died, or for a member of the armed forces who has died in active duty. The governor's authority to issue the order is more restricted than the president's and does not include the discretion to issue the order for state residents who do not meet the criteria stated.

Please restore the Flag of the United States of America to it's rightful position.

--The timing of your and Senator Graham's taking the public stand appears to many of us to be purely political. You both have higher political aspirations, and apparently took the advice of the Obama administration, "Don't let a tragedy go to waste."

--I feel that your claim and those of like-minded people who say "the flag is a deeply painful reminder of a brutally oppressive past" is a view used by white liberals, black race activists and black and white politicians to further their political agendas.

--More and more black people are realizing the politics behind the removal of the Confederate Flag and are coming out in support of leaving the flag where it is.

--A black lady was recently asked the question, "If you were stranded by the road with car trouble, who do you think would stop to help you?---a black or white politician in a Cadillac or BMW or a white man in a pick-up truck with a Confederate Flag flying? This smart, black lady said, "the man in the truck" and she would be correct 99% of the time. Supporters of the Confederate Flag are not generally racists.

--My wife and I are not racists. I was in banking for 45 years. I had the reputation for bending over backwards to help the minorities in Estill, SC, obtain loans and financial needs. My wife taught in the public schools of Hampton County for 35 years, mostly in Estill High School which is 99% black students. She, too, had the reputation of loving her students and wanting them to succeed. They also loved her as is evidenced by the hugs she receives today from former black students and even their parents when she meets them in stores and the public arena. Again, we are not racists but now is not the time to bring down the flag. The timing of your call makes it appear the flag was responsible for the actions of the deranged young man who killed the nine innocent victims.

--Many of the public figures (the President of USC and USC Coaches) who have spoken out in support of the removal of the flag are not from South Carolina and do not share our Southern Heritage.

--The Confederate flag reminds me of the Northern aggression when Sherman marched through the South burning churches, homes, farms, plantations, stealing anything of value, and taking the livestock and food supplies that harmed even the slaves whom they pretended to represent.

--Removing the flag is only a stepping stone to removing Confederate monuments and changing Confederate names on buildings and streets throughout South Carolina and the South. In fact, it has already begun.

--The Confederate Flag may be a reminder of the brutally oppressive past to you and others but what reminds me of the brutally oppressive modern-day slavery is the Lowcountry Regional Transit Authority buses coming to Hampton County to transport minorities to work in the low-paying service (maid) industry on Hilton Head Island. These buses arrive before sunrise and return after sunset most of the time---long hours away from home and low-pay. All of this to make life easier for those Yankee do-gooders who have moved south and decry slavery but yet practice a form of it themselves.

--In closing, I am very proud of the reactions of the black and white communities who came together in Charleston during the tragic deaths of the nine innocent victims. Also, as a citizen of South Carolina, I appreciate your presence in Charleston to help with the healing process, but your timing in associating the Confederate Flag with the mindset of this deranged young man was not wise and unwarranted in that it has caused a deep divide among the citizens of South Carolina. The location of the Confederate Flag is a matter better left to the debate and vote of the citizens of South Carolina--away from the politics of the moment.

--May God bless all of us in these tragic times. America is in deep trouble, and unless we turn back to God in both our public and private lives, this great nation is doomed. We have seen throughout history where God raised up great nations, they turned their backs on him, so he let them fall.

Governor Haley:

I'm writing you today regarding the Heritage Act and the current issue with the Confederate Flag. As I read the Heritage Act, it not only stipulates where certain Flags of the Confederacy shall be flown or displayed and prohibits its removal, it also prohibits "the removal, changing or renaming of any local or State monument, marker, memorial, school, or street erected or named in honor of the Confederacy or the Civil Rights Movement without the enactment of a joint resolution of the General Assembly approving same adopted by a two-thirds vote of the membership of each House;"

I bring up this point because there has been a lot of talk on network news stations in interviews with some of SC's representatives - particularly Congressman Clyburn - who stated in one particular interview that if the General Assembly voted to repeal the Heritage Act, that it would take away the protection of other Confederacy monuments and they would then be able to remove those as well. If those opposed want to view the Battle Flag as a "symbol of hate" that's one thing, but to even attempt to remove other statues, monuments, memorials, street names, etc., in our City and around our State because they are related to the Civil War/Confederacy, would be a blatant attempt at erasing the history of our State and our Nation. We cannot allow this type of thing to occur in our State. History should be respected, not erased.

I read through the SC Code pertaining to Memorials and Monuments in our State, and Section 10-1-165 does NOT specifically include protection for memorials and monuments erected to honor the Civil War or the Confederacy. This means that if the Legislators were to repeal the Heritage Act, any local or State Civil War or

Confederacy monument, marker, memorial, school, or street erected or named in honor of the Confederacy would then have NO protection from hate groups, activists, etc., that would seek their removal. It's interesting to note, however, that Section 10-1-165 does specifically list the "African-American History monuments or memorials erected on public property of the State", therefore, those monuments or memorials would still be protected.

"SECTION 10-1-165.

Protection of certain monuments and memorials.

(A) No Revolutionary War, War of 1812, Mexican War, War Between the States, Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, Korean War, Vietnam War, Persian Gulf War, Native American, or African-American History monuments or memorials erected on public property of the State or any of its political subdivisions may be relocated, removed, disturbed, or altered. No street, bridge, structure, park, preserve, reserve, or other public area of the State or any of its political subdivisions dedicated in memory of or named for any historic figure or historic event may be renamed or rededicated. No person may prevent the public body responsible for the monument or memorial from taking proper measures and exercising proper means for the protection, preservation, and care of these monuments, memorials, or nameplates.

(B) The provisions of this section may only be amended or repealed upon passage of an act which has received a two-thirds vote on the third reading of the bill in each branch of the General Assembly.

HISTORY: 2000 Act No. 292, Section 3."

I would respectfully request that any decision to remove the Confederate Flag from the Confederate Soldiers Monument, also include an amendment to Section 1-10-165 that would also prohibit the removal, changing, or renaming of any local or State monument, marker, memorial, school, or street erected or named in honor of the Civil War and the Confederacy without the enactment of a joint resolution of the General Assembly approving same adopted by a two-thirds vote of the membership of each House. *The same protection given those things in the Heritage Act of 2000.*

Thank you for your time and thank you for protecting ALL of the history of our great State, not just select periods in time.
