The state of South Carolina reached a tentative agreement Monday that bans police from holding motorists while checking to see if they are in the country illegally. Officers still can ask motorists stopped on other potential violations for documents to prove their citizenship, as provided for under the state's 2011 law.

Note: "Illegal immigration is still a serious issue in this state, and this settlement doesn't change that or Gov. Haley's position on the matter," said Haley spokesman Doug Mayer. "The fact is, the federal government has completely failed to address this problem and, until they do, South Carolina will continue doing what is necessary to uphold the laws of our state."
