Rock Hill Herald: S.C. Gov. Haley raises concerns over Giti Tire tariff

New tariffs placed by the U.S. Department of Commerce on tires manufactured in China – including those made by Giti Tire – have raised concerns in South Carolina. Gov. Nikki Haley wants commerce department officials to reconsider the 17.69 percent tariff targeted for Giti, which plans to build a plant in Chester County.

Note: Haley, in a Tuesday letter, said the tariff “inequitably affects Giti’s business.”

Note: Chaney Adams, Haley’s press secretary, said Thursday, “Governor Haley has always said we have to take care of our businesses and workers, Giti is a company that will take care of a lot of our families, and so when she became aware of the tariff situation, it was important to her to contact the Obama administration directly.”

Gov. Nikki Haley announced Thursday that the director of the agency that handles much of state government’s bureaucracy will be South Carolina’s first Department of Administration secretary. Haley named Marcia Adams to lead the agency that officially won’t exist until July 1. It will be South Carolina’s 17th Cabinet agency.

Marcia Adams, head of the soon-to-close agency that oversees much of S.C. state government operations, was named Thursday as the first director of the state’s new Department of Administration. Gov. Nikki Haley, to whom the new agency will report, appointed Adams to the post.

Note: “This is the one position that I am not the slightest bit nervous about,” Haley said. “I have seen her in action. I know what she thinks. We’re looking at a good finance person that understands this is all about making the lives of every agency easier and reducing the dollars of every taxpayer in South Carolina.”

WSPA: SC Lawmakers Looking at Several Options to Pay for Roads

Since finding a way to pay for South Carolina’s road and bridge needs is a top priority for state lawmakers, they’re looking at several different options for doing that. One bill prefiled in the House would raise the current \$300 sales tax cap on vehicles up to \$750, with the additional money going to roads and bridges.

Note: There has been talk about raising the state’s gas tax, which is about 16 cents a gallon, fourth-lowest in the nation. But Gov. Nikki Haley has said she’ll veto any tax increase. Because of that, some lawmakers area talking about having a referendum to let voters have a say in whether to raise the gas tax.

The State Election Commission has formally overturned last month’s election for Chester County supervisor, another step toward scheduling a new election. Shane Stuart, a petition candidate for county supervisor, filed an appeal after he lost to incumbent Carlisle Roddey by 230 votes.

Note: A date for the new election will be set by Gov. Nikki Haley within 75 to 90 days – which likely would schedule the election in February or March. She has 10 days to issue an order doing so.
