So I'm rewriting this so you also know what is going on. We have sent a copy of this to the sheriff of the county of Anderson and the major over the jail with no results. I am not sure if a copy of this made it to the health dept.

We are at the Anderson county jail and we are only able to get one roll of toilet paper a week. This don't always last for seven days. When we ask for more and let the guard know we are out we cant get more of a few guards will roll off a few rounds and give it to you and it an't enuf to use to bathroom one time and we might have two or three more days untill we get toilet paper. I have come to the point that we are having to use socks, wash clothes, and tear sheets to use so we can use the bathroom. This is very unsantary and I'd say toilet paper is cheaper than sheets and wash clothes and a plumber. But we are being left no choice. Thanks for your time and we are in hopes there no one else will help us with the issue at hand that you can and will.

1. The first thing I noticed when I stepped out of the car was the cold. It wasn't just the temperature, but the way the air felt like a blanket. I had heard that the weather in the north was harsh, but I didn't realize it would be so different from what I was used to. The wind was a constant presence, whipping through my hair and clothes. I pulled my coat tighter around me, trying to block out the chill. The ground beneath my feet was a mix of snow and ice, making every step a little more precarious. I looked up at the sky, where a few clouds were scattered across a pale blue. The sun was visible, but its light was diffused by the atmosphere, creating a soft, hazy glow. I took a deep breath, savoring the crispness of the air. It was a strange sensation, one that I had never experienced before. The world around me seemed so different, so much more alive. I knew that this was just the beginning of my journey, and I was excited to see what else I would discover.

The letter is being written for and on the behalf of the inmates at the Anderson county jail. We have three issues that we would like to be addressed for health and safety reasons. The first issue is. In here we are allowed to clean our cell all the chemical is one just throw the down flap also with the mucky mop that has been used with the same water to clean up to 10 cells with a office standing there. They dont supply or offer a rag or any thing to clean the sink or toilet with but a toilet brush. Because there is a officer standing there when the cleaning supplies are passed out why cant the down be open and it put throw the down because our food comes throw the same trap. A guard is also there when the food is passed out. It is very unhealthy and unsanitary for our food to come throw the same flap in the down as a mucky mop and chemicals. With a guard standing there why cant they pass one or the other throw the down. We are not on lock down so the doors are open on a daily basis and we mingle with the same officers. This is just a lousy thing on the officers side that is putting our health in danger. We would really appreciate this to be addressed.

The next I saw in C-Block of the Anderson county jail we have no ~~hot~~ hot water in the top shower. There is also so much mold and the shower walls that it is a health hazard and to the point people dont want to take showers. The showers

are never properly clean on the block. The only way the floor in the block is cleaned is if there is a fight and then if there is blood is the blood cleaned up in that area. The hole floor of the block is never cleaned. Then the nast mop water is dumped in the shower for us to walk and shower in. This is very nasty and unsanitary. We would really appreciate if this was addressed.

The third issue is hair cuts. We are not getting hair cuts to the point we can't make our self look presentable for court. also to the point state trustees are wearing hair nets on there beards but not on there head. This is also unsanitary. It is our understanding we are entitled to a hair cut once a month. If the state or county cant hold up to this they could at least get a barber from the street and let us pay for a hair cut every 30 day. But something needs to be done about this. It is unsanitary and puts us at a disadvantage for court. It would be very appreciated if this was addressed.
