Shoes Demonstrate Support for Cancer Patients, Survivors

COLUMBIA, S.C. – (April 13, 2016) – Earlier today, Clemson Football Coach Dabo Swinney and his wife Kathleen joined Governor Nikki Haley and dozens of South Carolina legislators in lacing up their sneakers to demonstrate support for cancer survivors, patients and caregivers as well as to honor those who have lost their battle with the disease. The event took place during the annual American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN) Day at the Capitol event.

"I am pleased to be here today standing with Coach Dabo Swinney, his wife Kathleen, state legislators and so many dedicated ACS CAN volunteers to show my support of cancer patients and caregivers in our state," said Governor Haley. "Cancer affects us all, no matter what your party affiliation might be. So, we need to work together to defeat this disease."

"Kathleen and I created Dabo's All In Foundation to raise awareness about important issues like cancer," said Swinney. "We are proud to lend our support to those who are fighting this disease and we encourage everyone to do their part in the fight against cancer. If we work together, I believe we can make tremendous strides toward a cancer-free world."

This year in South Carolina, an estimated 27,980 people will be diagnosed with cancer and 10,330 are expected to die from the disease. The ACS CAN legislative priorities in South Carolina for 2016 include: funding for cancer screening and treatment programs; supporting policies that have been proven effective in reducing tobacco use among adults and youth; and, improving access to health care in South Carolina.

Dozens of ACS CAN volunteers attended the event. Afterward, ACS CAN volunteers met with legislators to outline the organization's key legislative initiatives.
