Did you hear the news? The state of Washington lost its waiver from the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB). Why? Because lawmakers there did not approve a “simple change,” which required adding significant measures of student growth to educator evaluations. Newspaper editorials across the state criticized the lack of action, with one columnist noting it was a “small issue” with “massive consequences.” Here in South Carolina, we face similar concerns if the state’s educator evaluation system is not updated to include significant measures of student growth, which is a key component to maintaining the state’s waiver from NCLB. The State Board of Education is scheduled to vote on the issue on June 11.
