President Obama is preparing to lay out his priorities for the country in Tuesday night's State of the Union address, and so is one other person who will be answering him. While the president is technically the man of the night, the Republican party also gets a voice in rebuttal - a tradition that dates back to then House Minority Leader Gerald Ford in 1966, who went on to become president.

Note: "I always go back to that five -year-old Indian girl that lived in Bamberg that just wondered what was out there. And to be able to think that I will now have the ability to address the country is very humbling, but it's really an honor," Haley said.
