SC's Haley: State needs to stop saying no

(AP) CHARLESTON, S.C. — Gov. Nikki Haley said Tuesday that South Carolina came out ahead when its environmental board approved a Savannah River dredging permit that will help Georgia's ports and said it's time for the state to compete, not just say "no."

"I've taken on a state I'm very proud of but one that is used to saying no and can't," she told about 800 people attending a banquet of the Propeller Club of Charleston representing the city's maritime interests.

Haley said South Carolina got more than expected last week when it approved a water quality permit allowing the deepening of the channel of the river forming the border between the two states..

The Department of Health and Environmental Control initially planned to reject the permit. But Haley said that Georgia came back with an agreement to meet South Carolina's rules, including a 50-year commitment to maintain wetlands and control dissolved oxygen levels along the river.

"They hit their benchmarks and they did what they were supposed to do," Haley said. She added the state received a letter from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers that the dredging could be approved without the state permit so South Carolina came out ahead.

Georgia's 15-year push for a \$600 million project to deepen the river channel to handle larger ships was endorsed Tuesday by Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood. Savannah is one of the Port of Charleston's keenest competitors.

Haley said when DHEC was going to reject the permit, Georgia Gov. Nathan Deal flew to Columbia and asked Haley's permission for Georgia officials to meet with the DHEC board.

She said she agreed and added South Carolina needs to compete with Georgia, but not by being obstructionist.

"Our fight is not with Savannah. When I stood here a year ago and I said I'm tired of Georgia having their way with us, it was not because we were going to stop Savannah, it was because we were going to do something," she said. "We watched Savannah get distribution centers. We watched Savannah get transportation systems and we sat there and did nothing."

And she added that there's no chance South Carolina will get money to deepen the Charleston Harbor shipping channel without the help of Georgia's federal lawmakers.

"If you think we are going to get the permit for Charleston and keep Savannah from getting their funding, when they have two senators fighting as hard as ours, you're not being realistic," she said.

"We can work together and win or we can fight and be at a standstill. You decide that," Haley said. "I believe we deserve more. I don't believe we need to be petty about it and I don't think we need to say no to everyone else because we're scared to fight and scared to win."

South Carolina's attorney general has agreed to represent the Savannah River Maritime Commission in its opposition to Georgia's plans to dredge the river channel. A spokesman said Attorney General Alan Wilson would represent the commission that legislators created in 2007.

On Monday, the commission voted unanimously to invalidate the water quality permit.

Haley said South Carolina needs to worry more about competing and less about suing. For some South Carolinians "every time something comes up they want to fight, they want to sue and they want to do something else."

An opinion last year by the Attorney General's Office said that DHEC has sole authority to issue a water quality permit.

Georgians pledge backing for S.C. port

Deal, senators call Charleston a partner to Savannah

Working closely with the state of South Carolina on regional economic development, Georgia Gov. Nathan Deal and U.S. Sens. Saxby Chambliss and Johnny Isakson pledged today to support efforts to deepen not only the Port of Savannah but also the Port of Charleston.

The Georgians announce this effort a day after U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood brought welcome news to Georgia, saying that deepening the Savannah Port "has to happen."

"Georgia has fought long and hard to deepen the Port of Savannah, and we're experiencing great progress on that front," Deal said. "We see the Port of Savannah deepening as a boon to the economy of the Southeast, not just Georgia. This is a regional effort; that's why we give our support to deepening the Port of Charleston. Many South Carolina

exports leave the country from Savannah and many Georgia exports leave out of Charleston. The ports of Savannah and Charleston are partners, not competitors. We're in a new day with bigger ships, and we need deeper ports. We must work together across state lines to the benefit of Georgians and South Carolinians alike."

"I am grateful for the cooperation of Gov. Haley and others in South Carolina as we work toward progress on both the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project and expansion of the Charleston Harbor, together which will benefit the entire Southeast," Chambliss said. "It is imperative that we all work together to ensure our region is not left behind after the expansion of the Panama Canal."

"It is critical for Georgia and South Carolina to work together in expanding both our ports to accommodate larger ships and to remain competitive," said Isakson. "The positive economic impact of expanding both ports is undeniable, not just for our individual states, but for the entire region and the nation. I will continue to do all that I can to help in this partnership between Georgia and South Carolina."

Dear Mr. Bailey:

The South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control (Department) received your application on November 15, 2010, for a 401 Water Quality Certification to deepen the navigation channel in the Savannah River. After reviewing the General Re-Evaluation Report (GRR) and the draft Tier II Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) submitted with the permit application, the Department is concerned that the project, as proposed, does not meet the requirements for issuance of a Water Quality Certification pursuant to Section 401 of the Clean Water Act and the requirements of State Regulation 61-101, Water Quality Certification.

In assessing the water quality impacts of this project, Regulation 61-101 requires that the Department address and consider whether there are feasible alternatives to the activity. Section F.(5)(b) of this regulation states that certification will be denied if there is a feasible alternative to the activity which reduces adverse consequences on water quality and classified water uses. The GRR and the EIS mentioned several alternatives that would alter the project impacts. Some of these alternatives include dredging to various project depths, various mitigation plans, and several alternative sites. Although the documents consider some alternatives, the analysis does not thoroughly evaluate all feasible alternatives for a project of this magnitude. For example, it seems reasonable to consider alternatives on a regional basis for such a large-scale project involving significant environmental impacts. The GRR and EIS do not consider whether or not other southeastern ports could be expanded with less cost or environmental impacts.

The Savannah River Maritime Commission, the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources, and the Southern Environmental Law Center each submitted comments on the GRR and EIS. These letters suggest that the Jasper Port Terminal alternative is viable and may have less environmental impacts than the proposed deepening. For these reasons, the establishment of a Jasper Port Terminal should be given detailed consideration as an option to the extensive cost and environmental impacts associated with the proposed expansion of the Garden City Terminal. The Department cannot meet its obligation under Regulation 61-101 by issuing a certification without a thorough investigation of all feasible alternatives. It is recommended that the

alternatives analysis for the project be amended to include the evaluation of all feasible alternatives to the proposed project.

In evaluating any project pursuant to Regulation 61-101, the Department must certify that there is reasonable assurance that the activity will be conducted in a manner that will not violate applicable water quality standards. The Water Classifications and Standards listed in Regulation 61-68 were promulgated in accordance with Section 303 of the Clean Water Act. This regulation also contains antidegradation rules that were established to ensure the protection of existing uses and water quality regardless of the water classification.

Existing conditions in the Savannah River have resulted in contraventions of the dissolved oxygen (DO) standard, particularly in the river estuaries during the warm summer months. The studies conducted for the SHEP indicate that the project will cause additional impacts to DO levels in the river system. Adding DO impacts to a waterbody that is currently experiencing low DO at certain times of the year is not consistent with the antidegradation rules of Regulation 61-68. The Corps plans to use Speece Cones to inject oxygen into the river to mitigate for the DO impacts resulting from the proposed deepening.

After evaluating the DO modeling data, and the mitigation proposal outlined in the GRR and EIS, the Department is concerned with the uncertainty relating to the use of mechanical injection as mitigation for the DO impacts, especially in the shallow water areas of the Back River. The Corps is relying entirely on modeling data to support the conclusion that the Speece Cones will adequately restore DO in the river system to pre-project conditions. Furthermore, the oxygen injection system is a very costly method to mitigate for the projected impacts, and the funding for the long-term operational costs depends on unpredictable annual appropriations. Until the uncertainty from the DO impacts and mitigation has been thoroughly investigated, and reasonable assurance is provided that the project will protect existing uses and water quality standards for the life of the project, the Department cannot find the project consistent with the requirements of Regulation 61-101.

In addition to the impacts from DO, the ecosystem will also sustain significant wetland impacts. The project will impact 14.08 acres of salt marsh wetlands from excavation and indirectly impact 1,212 acres of freshwater wetlands due to increased salinity at the maximum project depth. The Corps has proposed a mitigation plan to offset these impacts. This plan includes the preservation of various properties that will become part of the Savannah National Wildlife Refuge (SNWR), the restoration of wetlands through flow altering structures, and the creation of salt marsh by grading down an area of high ground that was previously used as a dredge disposal area.

Section F.(5)(a) of Regulation 61-101 states that certification will be denied if the proposed activity alters the ecosystem in the vicinity of the project such that its functions and values are eliminated or impaired. The mitigation proposal submitted in the GRR and EIS fails to give reasonable assurance that the ecosystem will not be permanently impaired by the extensive wetland impacts from salinity intrusion. The preservation component of the mitigation plan lists several properties that would be acquired and subsequently placed under control of the SNWR. Although the EIS states that these properties contain desirable ecological resources, the

amount of wetland acreage or type of wetlands contained in these properties was not included in the EIS. In addition, the mitigation credit taken by the Corps for restoration includes the creation of 1,068 acres of brackish marsh for the 48 ft depth alternative. The flow altering structures will reduce salinity in some of the marsh areas; however, these structures will cause the conversion of salt and freshwater marsh to brackish marsh. The loss of any type of marsh should be considered an impact. Given the extensive loss of existing freshwater marsh within the ecosystem and the lack of an appropriate mitigation plan, the Department cannot certify that this project complies with the mandates in Regulations 61-101 and 61-68.

Much of the marsh areas that will be impacted by this project are located in the SNWR. Much of these impacts are to freshwater tidally influenced wetlands. These areas have been in decline for many years due to salinity intrusion from natural causes and from past harbor deepening activities. The proposed project poses a significant threat to these unique areas. The mitigation plan includes preservation of land that will be acquired by the refuge. As stated previously, the Department is concerned that the out-of-kind preservation of land does not adequately offset the significant loss of ecological resources due to this project. Regulation 61-101 states that certification will be denied if the proposed activity impacts special or unique habitats. The SNWR is considered a unique area, as such, the Department cannot issue a certification for the proposed activity unless the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) gives concurrence that this project will not cause adverse impacts to the SNWR.

The proposed deepening will occur in waters containing Federally recognized threatened or endangered species. Species such as Shortnosed sturgeon, Atlantic sturgeon, various sea turtles, and West Indian manatees may all be impacted by the project. The loss of a significant portion of Shortnose sturgeon habitat due to lower DO levels and salinity intrusion is of particular concern. Regulation 61-101 states in Section 5(c) that certification will be denied if the project adversely impacts waters containing State or Federally recognized rare, threatened, or endangered species. Although the Corps proposes to mitigate for the loss of Shortnose sturgeon habitat by installing fish passage at the Savannah Bluff Lock and Dam, it is not known if this measure will adequately mitigate for the impacts to sturgeon. Endangered species impacts are typically evaluated by resource agencies such as the USFWS and the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS). Without concurrence from these agencies that the project will not cause adverse impacts to threatened or endangered species, the Department cannot certify this project.

In addition to the above list of concerns about the proposed project, the Department has not received a complete response to our previous request for information. On November 23, 2010, the Department sent a letter requesting an affidavit of public notice for the project, a list of adjacent property owners, and the application fee of \$1,000. We received the affidavit and list of property owners, but we have not received the requested fee. Pursuant to Regulation 61-30, Environmental Protection Fees, the Department is authorized to collect application fees for Water Quality Certification.

In conclusion, the Department has several concerns about issuing a certification for this project. As currently proposed, this project does not meet the requirements for issuance of a Water Quality Certification pursuant to Section 401 of the Clean Water Act, 33 U.S.C. Section 1341, and the requirements of State Regulation 61-101, Water Quality Certification. It is

strongly recommended that the Corps withdraw the current application and address the issues outlined in this letter before continuing the 401 Certification process. If the Corps determines that it is necessary to move forward with a certification decision at this time, the fee should be submitted as soon as possible. Pursuant to Regulation 61-30, and Regulation 61-101, the Department has 180 days to complete action on an application for 401 Water Quality Certification or the assessed fee must be returned. These 180 days include only those days in which the Department is actively reviewing the application; the clock stops when information is requested and the Department is waiting on a response. Accordingly, the 180-day clock for this project will not start until the Department receives the requested fee and subsequent information. Swati,

Last year, the AG issued an opinion in response to a request from the Maritime Commission. One of the Maritime Commission's questions was:

Must the Department of Health and Environmental Control's (DHEC) action on the matter of the issuance or denial of a water quality certification under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act for the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project be consistent with the position of the Savannah River Maritime Commission?

The AG's response was:

It is the opinion of this Office that DHEC has the sole authority to issue 401 water quality certifications. The General Assembly did not change this authority in the joint resolution, S.C. Code § 54-6-10. Therefore, DHEC's action on the matter of issuance or denial of a water quality certification under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act for the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project need not be consistent with the position of the Commission. The Commission does not possess the authority to order DHEC to reach any certain decision as the decision on a 401 certification is solely DHEC's responsibility. 25A S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101 (Supp. 2009). However, DHEC seeks and considers the views of interested persons in regard to a 401 certification through public notice and hearing. 25AS.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101(D) & (E) (Supp. 2009).


The Commission has been deeply involved in the project being proposed by the Corps of Engineers and the Georgia State Ports Authority to deepen Savannah Harbor and approaches from 42 ft. to 48 ft. The General Assembly provided us the resources to do a very detailed evaluation of the project with particular attention to its impacts on South Carolina's plans to develop the Jasper Ocean Terminal. We engaged a nationally recognized engineering consultant who, after extensive consultation with all affected State Agencies, including particularly DHEC, prepared a complete set of comments on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement, which the Commission adopted and submitted to the Corps on January 21, 2011.

I have attached a copy of the cover letter submitted to the Corps with those comments and a computer disc that contains a complete set of the Commission's comments.

I understand that the matter of DHEC's denial of the requested Section 401 Water Quality Certification for the Project will be on the Board's agenda for November 10. DHEC staff has advised me that the Commission's comments on the Draft EIS are already a part of the DHEC record. Re: Comments on the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project Draft Tier II Environmental Impact Statement and General Reevaluation Report (the "Documents")

Dear Mr. Bailey:

Please find attached the comments (the "Comments") of the Savannah River Maritime Commission on the above mentioned Documents. Our comments are extensive and reflect a careful review of the Documents, the accompanying appendices and the referenced studies. While the majority of the Comments focus on the details of the reports and their adequacy in light of the significant impacts of the proposed Savannah Harbor Expansion Project (the "Project"), there are many that reflect significant concerns about the Project itself.

The Savannah River Maritime Commission is authorized pursuant to S.C. Code Section 54-6-10 to represent South Carolina "in all matters pertaining to the navigability, depth, dredging, wastewater and sludge disposal, and related collateral issues in regard to the use of the Savannah River as a waterway for ocean-going container or commerce vessels". South Carolina will set forth its position on the Project under separate cover. However, there are four significant issues, in addition to the Comments, that we feel need to be highlighted about the Project at this time.

1. The Project as designed will not allow the development of the Jasper Ocean Terminal. The dredge spoil disposal plan shows that the two sites for the Jasper Ocean Terminal (sites 14A and 14B) will be key disposal sites for the Project's construction and maintenance dredging spoil. Disposal on those sites is projected to occur for over 50 years. The channel is not designed to accommodate fully loaded post-Panamax ships and these of course would be the ships most likely to use the Jasper terminal. Additionally, the traffic in the Savannah River projected to use the Garden City Terminal will be so intense that docking and maneuvering operations at the Jasper terminal will be nearly impossible. Since it is the avowed intent of both the State of Georgia and the State of South Carolina to develop an ocean terminal on the so called Jasper site, we believe that this project should be designed to make that site available and to adequately accommodate the shipping that will utilize that terminal, as well as that proceeding upstream to the Garden City Terminal.

2. The Project is inadequate. As proposed, the Project does not create a navigation situation that is adequate to support the projected growth in shipping and the transition from Panamax ships to post-Panamax ships. The offshore channel is not deep enough to accommodate post-Panamax ships at maneuvering speed and is too narrow to allow two ships to pass. There is only one viable passing lane along the 30 + miles of dredged channel. This effective one-way channel will not allow the density of shipping that is projected and on which the benefits of the Project are based.

3. The environmental impacts are significant. South Carolina has significant concerns about the impact of the Project on the water quality of the Savannah River Basin, on the wetlands in the Savannah National Wildlife Refuge and on the habitats for the endangered Short Nosed Sturgeon and Atlantic Sturgeon and the Striped Bass as well as other plant and animal species. Our review of the documents reveals that there is still considerable uncertainty about these impacts despite the extensive research carried out by the Corps and its consultants. We do not believe that the proposed mitigation for the dissolved oxygen impacts has been proven effective at this scale and even if it were to be effective, there is no guarantee that it would be funded for operations and maintenance in the future. The failure of this mitigation would further inhibit the ability of South Carolina's industries and municipalities to utilize the Savannah River for permitted wastewater disposal.

4. The DEIS and the GRR completely ignore the benefits that will accrue to South Carolina from a properly designed project. The benefit calculation focuses solely on the efficiency benefits to ship owners from the proposed improvements. Because the driving assumption is that no increase in TEUs is expected from the project, the arguably significant growth in port business that will occur is not quantified. Such discussion that does occur focuses solely on Chatham and surrounding Georgia Counties. In short, there is no documentation that would allow South Carolina to evaluate the economic benefits or costs of the Project to its citizens. The analysis also does not consider the best alternatives to maximize the benefits to the Savannah River Basin as a whole and the communities in both states, particularly given the aforementioned impacts on a potential Jasper Ocean Terminal. Given the skepticism about the Project in much of South Carolina, this is a very significant shortcoming in the Documents.

It is clear from our review that the Project is asking entirely too much of the relatively narrow and environmentally stressed Savannah River. A more rational approach to the undisputed need to increase the capacity of this important port would be to select the alternative that minimizes the unavoidable environmental damages and then proceed immediately to the joint development of the Jasper Ocean Terminal.

Because South Carolina's citizens and its environment are significantly affected by the Project, we request that these Documents be revised to address our specific concerns and suggestions and that the Corps and the Georgia Ports Authority consider

very carefully whether this project, as conceived, is what the region needs to support its future shipping and to maximize the economic benefits to the citizens and communities of both South Carolina and Georgia.

Swati, the issues which led to the initial denial and the solutions offered by the Army Corps and Ga. Ports Authority are as follows:

1. Dissolved Oxygen:

(A) COE will commit to operation of the Dissolved Oxygen system as stated in the letter from Col.

Jeffrey M. Hall of November 4, 2011, specifically:

First, the project Record of Decision will expressly recognize a binding commitment to install, operate, and maintain the DO system in accordance with the project mitigation plan, subject to Congressional appropriation of funds for the project. Second, the Savannah District will make the DO system a top priority for annual operation and maintenance (O&M) funds appropriated and received for the project, above normal maintenance requirements.

(B) The State of Georgia, including instrumentalities and agencies thereof, will provide financial assurance, in a manner acceptable to DHEC, that it will fund operation and maintenance of the Dissolved Oxygen system in any year that sufficient federal funds for the operation and maintenance of the system are not made available. This obligation extends for the life of the project (50 years). Such financial assurance may be achieved through a Standby Trust Fund, Surety Bond, Letter of Credit, Insurance, or other means deemed acceptable to DHEC. The State of Georgia will provide the financial assurance before any dredging begins.

2. Wetlands Mitigation:

To address DHEC concerns about the sufficiency of mitigation for potential impacts on salt marsh, the State of Georgia agrees to transfer to the State of South Carolina or to preserve in perpetuity from development an amount of acreage of salt marsh in South Carolina equivalent to 2,200 mitigation credits (generally 1,690 acres) as part of its Environmental Sustainability Program.

3. Shortnose Sturgeon:

COE shall comply with all terms and conditions in the National Marine Fisheries Service Final Biological Opinion.

4. Archaeological Resources:

To ensure protection of cultural resources, DHEC must receive an executed Programmatic Agreement for Cultural Resources signed by the Corps and the South Carolina Historic Preservation Office.

5. Alternatives Analysis: With DHEC's other, more specific concerns addressed, we believe the requirements for issuance of the 401 certification have been met.

Also, I don't seem to have the AG's opinion on the Maritime Commission at the moment, but my opinion request letter is attached, FYI. The AG's opinion affirmed the position stated in my letter.

Last year, the AG issued an opinion in response to a request from the Maritime Commission. One of the Maritime Commission's questions was:

Must the Department of Health and Environmental Control's (DHEC) action on the matter of the issuance or denial of a water quality certification under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act for the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project be consistent with the position of the Savannah River Maritime Commission?

The AG's response was:

It is the opinion of this Office that DHEC has the sole authority to issue 401 water quality certifications. The General Assembly did not change this authority in the joint resolution, S.C. Code § 54-6-10. Therefore, DHEC's action on the matter of issuance or denial of a water quality certification under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act for the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project need not be consistent with the position of the Commission. The Commission does not possess the authority to order DHEC to reach any certain decision as the decision on a 401 certification is solely DHEC's responsibility. 25A S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101 (Supp. 2009). However, DHEC seeks and considers the views of interested persons in regard to a 401 certification through public notice and hearing. 25AS.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101(D) & (E) (Supp. 2009).

Dear Mr. Moss:

We received your letter requesting an opinion of this Office concerning the powers of the Savannah River Maritime Commission, particularly as those powers relate to federally delegated responsibilities of state agencies. You asked the following questions:

1. Does the Savannah River Maritime Commission have the right and the responsibility to provide South Carolina's official comments on the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project and may it require the comments of other State Agencies on the project to be routed through the Commission?
2. Must the Department of Health and Environmental Control's (DHEC) action on the matter of the issuance or denial of a water quality certification under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act for the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project be consistent with the position of the Savannah River Maritime Commission?

As a way of background, you explained in the request letter that the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project (SHEP) will provide for the deepening of the Savannah Harbor from 42 feet to 48 feet to allow for the passage and accommodation of much larger container ships. The project is jointly sponsored by the State of Georgia (through the Georgia State Ports Authority) and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Over the next several months, the Corps of Engineers will solicit public comments on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement on SHEP. The change caused by this project would have a significant potential impact on water quality in the Savannah River and on South Carolina's environment and economy.

Section 401 of the federal Clean Water Act provides that South Carolina is responsible for providing a 401 water quality certification (or to deny such certification) when the permitting process begins. As part of its delegated authority from the federal Environmental Protection Agency, DHEC is responsible for providing or denying this certification.

Law/Analysis

Question 1

The National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requires federal agencies to consider the environmental impact of their proposed actions and reasonable alternatives to those actions. 42 U.S.C. 4321 *et seq.*¹ As mentioned above, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers is preparing an Environmental Impact Statement for SHEP pursuant to the National Environmental Policy Act and is required to receive and consider public comments.²

The General Assembly created the Savannah River Maritime Commission ("Commission") in 2007 by joint resolution, 2007 Act No. 56, Section 6 which is now codified as S.C. Code § 54-6-10. The Commission's authority is stated as follows:

In addition to the above provisions of this joint resolution, a commission to be known as the Savannah River Maritime Commission is hereby established to **represent this State** in all matters pertaining to the navigability, depth, dredging, wastewater and sludge disposal, and related collateral issues in regard to the use of the Savannah River as a waterway for ocean-going container or commerce vessels. The commission as an instrumentality of this State is empowered to **negotiate on behalf of the State** of South Carolina and **enter into agreements** with the State of Georgia, the United States Army Corps of Engineers, and other involved parties in regard to the above which bind the State of South Carolina; provided, however, that any such agreements which require state funding are subject to the funding being provided by the General Assembly in a general or supplemental appropriations act or in a bond bill.

S.C. Code § 54-6-10(A) (emphasis added).

If a statute's language is plain, unambiguous, and conveys a clear meaning, then the rules of statutory interpretation are not needed and a court has no right to impose another meaning. The words must be given their plain and ordinary meaning without resorting to subtle or forced construction which

limit or expand the statute's operation. Strickland v. Strickland, 375 S.C. 76, 88-89, 650 S.E.2d 465, 472 (2007); Op. S.C. Atty. Gen., June 13, 2008.

It is clearly stated that the Commission has authority to "represent the State," "negotiate on behalf of the State," and "enter into agreement." However, there is no mention of the Commission's authority to restrict the federal right of another to submit comments. The Commission certainly has a right to submit comments and is encouraged to do so. In fact, the Commission may "represent the State" and relay comments from the public or other South Carolina agencies to the U.S. Corps of Engineers. However, the Commission does not have power to prevent others from independently submitting comments on the Draft Environmental Impact Statement. Individuals and agencies may directly submit comments to the U.S. Corps of Engineers.

Question 2

S.C. Code § 54-6-10(F) specifically explains the Commission's authority in relation to other state agencies or departments:

Except as provided below, **nothing in this section shall supersede the authority of other state agencies, departments, or instrumentalities including the Department of Natural Resources, the Department of Health and Environmental Control, or the State Ports Authority to exercise all powers, duties, and functions within their responsibilities as provided by law. However, on an interstate basis and specifically in regard to the State of Georgia, the responsibilities granted to the Savannah River Maritime Commission in this joint resolution supersede any other concurrent responsibilities** of a particular state agency or department. Any requirements for permitting and constructing new terminal facilities on the Savannah River in Jasper County are declared not to be the responsibility of this commission,³ except as they may relate to this state's responsibility for the navigability or depth of the South Carolina portion of the Savannah River.

S.C. Code § 54-6-10(F) (emphasis added). The statute is clear that the Commission's authority does not supersede any other state agency's authority, specifically DHEC's. However, there is an exception: "on an interstate basis and specifically in regard to the State of Georgia" when "concurrent responsibilit[y]" is given. The situation at hand does not fall into the exception because there is no concurrent responsibility here.

DHEC is solely responsible for issuing or denying the 401 water quality certification. The only regulation in South Carolina that provides a procedure for issuing 401 certifications is R. 61-101. This regulation specifies DHEC's process as follows:

³ The matter at issue here is the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project and does not involve responsibility for permitting and constructing a new terminal facility in Jasper County. A 401 certification involves water quality, not navigability or depth.

A. GENERAL

- (1) This regulation establishes procedures and policies for implementing State water quality certification requirements of Section 401 of the Clean Water Act, 33 U.S.C. Section 1341.
- (2) Any applicant for a Federal license or permit to conduct any activity which during construction or operation may result in any discharge to navigable waters is required by Federal law to first obtain a certification from the Department.⁴ Potential applicants are encouraged to contact the Department prior to submitting an application. Federal law provides that no Federal license or permit is to be granted until such certification is obtained . . .
- (3) The Department may issue, deny, or revoke general certifications for categories of activities or for activities specified in Federal nationwide or general dredge and fill permits pursuant to Federal law or regulations. Such general certifications are subject to the same process as individual certifications.

...

F. SCOPE OF REVIEW FOR APPLICATION DECISIONS

- (3) In assessing the water quality impacts of the project, the Department will address and consider the following factors:
 - (a) whether the activity is water dependent and the intended purpose of the activity;
 - (b) whether there are feasible alternatives to the activity;
 - (c) all potential water quality impacts of the project, both direct and indirect, over the life of the project including:
 - (1) impact on existing and classified water uses;
 - (2) physical, chemical, and biological impacts, including cumulative impacts;
 - (3) the effect on circulation patterns and water movement;
 - (4) the cumulative impacts of the proposed activity and reasonably foreseeable similar activities of the applicant and others.

25A S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101(Supp. 2009). The regulation above specifically references DHEC and gives DHEC the authority to issue or deny the 401 certifications.

S.C. Code § 54-6-10(F) explains that the Commission will not supersede the authority of another state agency or department unless there is concurrent responsibility between the agency and the Commission relating to an issue "on an interstate basis . . . specifically in regard to the State of Georgia." The South Carolina Code of Laws of 1976 does not mention the term "interstate basis"

anywhere else in the code. Therefore, we must rely on the plain language of the term "interstate basis." The Savannah Harbor Expansion Project does involve the State of Georgia, so the project could be considered interstate. Nevertheless, there does not appear to be concurrent responsibility shared between DHEC and the Commission as provided in the joint resolution. S.C. Code § 54-6-10(A) gives the Commission authority to "represent the State," "negotiate on behalf of the State," and "enter into agreement," yet there is no mention of the Commission's authority to require DHEC to issue a certification consistent with the Commission's position.

Conclusion

Question 1


It is the opinion of this Office the Savannah River Maritime Commission has the right to provide comments on the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project. However, S.C. Code § 54-6-10 provides no authority for the Commission to restrict the federal right of another to file comments on the Environmental Impact Statement or to require any party to route comments through the Commission.

Question 2

It is the opinion of this Office that DHEC has the sole authority to issue 401 water quality certifications. The General Assembly did not change this authority in the joint resolution, S.C. Code § 54-6-10. Therefore, DHEC's action on the matter of issuance or denial of a water quality certification under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act for the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project need not be consistent with the position of the Commission. The Commission does not possess the authority to order DHEC to reach any certain decision as the decision on a 401 certification is solely DHEC's responsibility. 25A S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101 (Supp. 2009). However, DHEC seeks and considers the views of interested persons in regard to a 401 certification through public notice and hearing. 25A S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101(D) & (E) (Supp. 2009).



Swati, the issues which led to the initial denial and the solutions offered by the Army Corps and Ga. Ports Authority are as follows:

1. Dissolved Oxygen:

(A) COE will commit to operation of the Dissolved Oxygen system as stated in the letter from Col.

Jeffrey M. Hall of November 4, 2011, specifically:

First, the project Record of Decision will expressly recognize a binding commitment to install, operate, and maintain the DO system in accordance with the project mitigation plan, subject to Congressional appropriation of funds for the project. Second, the Savannah District will make the DO system a top priority for annual operation and maintenance (O&M) funds appropriated and received for the project, above normal maintenance requirements.

(B) The State of Georgia, including instrumentalities and agencies thereof, will provide financial assurance, in a manner acceptable to DHEC, that it will fund operation and maintenance of the Dissolved Oxygen system in any year that sufficient federal funds for the operation and maintenance of the system are not made available. This obligation extends for the life of the project (50 years).

Such financial assurance may be achieved through a Standby Trust Fund, Surety Bond, Letter of Credit, Insurance, or other means deemed acceptable to DHEC. The State of Georgia will provide the financial assurance before any dredging begins.

2. Wetlands Mitigation:

To address DHEC concerns about the sufficiency of mitigation for potential impacts on salt marsh, the State of Georgia agrees to transfer to the State of South Carolina or to preserve in perpetuity from development an amount of acreage of salt marsh in South Carolina equivalent to 2,200 mitigation credits (generally 1,690 acres) as part of its Environmental Sustainability Program.

3. Shortnose Sturgeon:

COE shall comply with all terms and conditions in the National Marine Fisheries Service Final Biological Opinion.

4. Archaeological Resources:

To ensure protection of cultural resources, DHEC must receive an executed Programmatic Agreement for Cultural Resources signed by the Corps and the South Carolina Historic Preservation Office.

5. Alternatives Analysis: With DHEC's other, more specific concerns addressed, we believe the requirements for issuance of the 401 certification have been met.

Also, I don't seem to have the AG's opinion on the Maritime Commission at the moment, but my opinion request letter is attached, FYI. The AG's opinion affirmed the position stated in my letter.

Swati, the issues which led to the initial denial and the solutions offered by the Army Corps and Ga. Ports Authority are as follows:

1. Dissolved Oxygen:

(A) COE will commit to operation of the Dissolved Oxygen system as stated in the letter from Col.

Jeffrey M. Hall of November 4, 2011, specifically:

First, the project Record of Decision will expressly recognize a binding commitment to install, operate, and maintain the DO system in accordance with the project mitigation plan, subject to Congressional appropriation of funds for the project. Second, the Savannah District will make the DO system a top priority for annual operation and maintenance (O&M) funds appropriated and received for the project, above normal maintenance requirements.

(B) The State of Georgia, including instrumentalities and agencies thereof, will provide financial assurance, in a manner acceptable to DHEC, that it will fund operation and maintenance of the Dissolved Oxygen system in any year that sufficient federal funds for the operation and maintenance of the system are not made available. This obligation extends for the life of the project (50 years). Such financial assurance may be achieved through a Standby Trust Fund, Surety Bond, Letter of Credit, Insurance, or other means deemed acceptable to DHEC. The State of Georgia will provide the financial assurance before any dredging begins.

2. Wetlands Mitigation:

To address DHEC concerns about the sufficiency of mitigation for potential impacts on salt marsh, the State of Georgia agrees to transfer to the State of South Carolina or to preserve in perpetuity from development an amount of acreage of salt marsh in South Carolina equivalent to 2,200 mitigation credits (generally 1,690 acres) as part of its Environmental Sustainability Program.

3. Shortnose Sturgeon:

COE shall comply with all terms and conditions in the National Marine Fisheries Service Final Biological Opinion.

4. Archaeological Resources:

To ensure protection of cultural resources, DHEC must receive an executed Programmatic Agreement for Cultural Resources signed by the Corps and the South Carolina Historic Preservation Office.

5. Alternatives Analysis: With DHEC's other, more specific concerns addressed, we believe the requirements for issuance of the 401 certification have been met.

Also, I don't seem to have the AG's opinion on the Maritime Commission at the moment, but my opinion request letter is attached, FYI. The AG's opinion affirmed the position stated in my letter.

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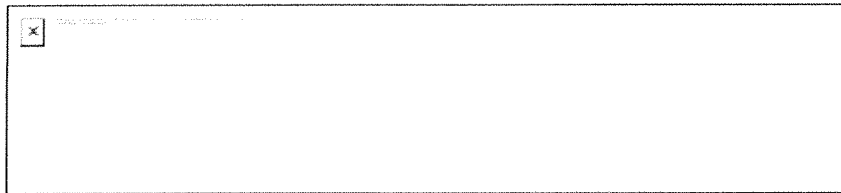

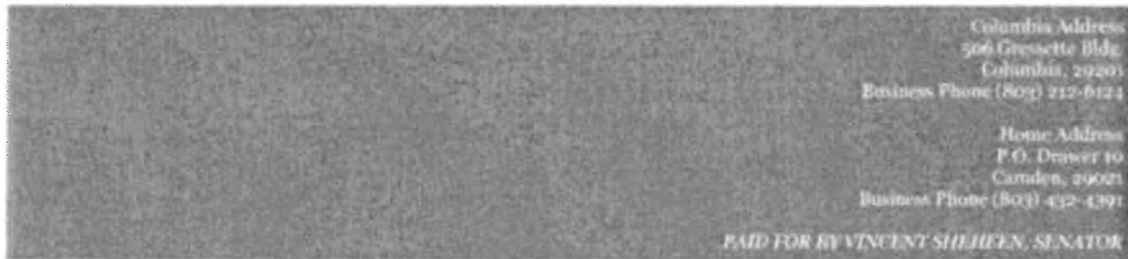

Last year, the AG issued an opinion in response to a request from the Maritime Commission. One of the Maritime Commission's questions was:

Must the Department of Health and Environmental Control's (DHEC) action on the matter of the issuance or denial of a water quality certification under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act for the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project be consistent with the position of the Savannah River Maritime Commission?

The AG's response was:

It is the opinion of this Office that DHEC has the sole authority to issue 401 water quality certifications. The General Assembly did not change this authority in the joint resolution, S.C. Code § 54-6-10. Therefore, DHEC's action on the matter of issuance or denial of a water quality certification under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act for the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project need

not be consistent with the position of the Commission. The Commission does not possess the authority to order DHEC to reach any certain decision as the decision on a 401 certification is solely DHEC's responsibility. 25A S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101 (Supp. 2009). However, DHEC seeks and considers the views of interested persons in regard to a 401 certification through public notice and hearing. 25AS.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101(D) & (E) (Supp. 2009).

Last year, the AG issued an opinion in response to a request from the Maritime Commission. One of the Maritime Commission's questions was:

Must the Department of Health and Environmental Control's (DHEC) action on the matter of the issuance or denial of a water quality certification under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act for the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project be consistent with the position of the Savannah River Maritime Commission?

The AG's response was:

It is the opinion of this Office that DHEC has the sole authority to issue 401 water quality certifications. The General Assembly did not change this authority in the joint resolution, S.C. Code § 54-6-10. Therefore, DHEC's action on the matter of issuance or denial of a water quality certification under Section 401 of the Clean Water Act for the Savannah Harbor Expansion Project need not be consistent with the position of the Commission. The Commission does not possess the authority to order DHEC to reach any certain decision as the decision on a 401 certification is solely DHEC's responsibility. 25A S.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101 (Supp. 2009). However, DHEC seeks and considers the views of interested persons in regard to a 401 certification through public notice and hearing. 25AS.C. Code Ann. Regs. 61-101(D) & (E) (Supp. 2009).

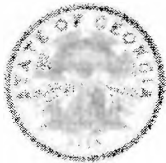

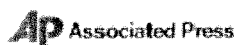

Deal, senators call Charleston a partner to Savannah

Working closely with the state of South Carolina on regional economic development, Georgia Gov. Nathan Deal and U.S. Sens. Saxby Chambliss and Johnny Isakson pledged today to support efforts to deepen not only the Port of Savannah but also the Port of Charleston.

The Georgians announce this effort a day after U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood brought welcome news to Georgia, saying that deepening the Savannah Port "has to happen."

"Georgia has fought long and hard to deepen the Port of Savannah, and we're experiencing great progress on that front," Deal said. Folks,

The DHEC board made a remarkable decision yesterday to approve the water quality permit for dredging the Savannah River, overturning the staff's decision to deny it. It has been widely alleged that Governor Haley directed her board appointees to reverse the staff decision after she was promised a prominent speaking position at next year's Republican National Convention in Tampa.

SCDHEC Flip-Flops On Georgia Port Ruling

By a unanimous vote, S.C. Gov. Nikki Haley's appointees to the Department of Health and Environmental Control (SCDHEC) board granted the Georgia Ports Authority permission to deepen the waterway leading to the Port of Savannah – an unexpected and hugely controversial decision that opponents say could cost the Palmetto State hundreds of millions of dollars over the coming decade.

The board's decision to allow Georgia's deepening project to proceed reversed the agency's prior decision – reached on September 30 – to deny the permits that Georgia was seeking.

In fact, a State Senator tells FITS that the agency may have been "pressured" into taking another look at the permit applications, presumably by Haley or members of her administration.

Why would a South Carolina governor pressure a state agency to forsake the best interests of its own citizens to benefit another state?

Glad you asked ...

According to our sources, monied Georgia interests with connections to the Port of Savannah **threw a big fundraiser for Haley** in Atlanta last month. Also, our sources say that the chairman of the Georgia Ports Authority – a major GOP donor who will select speakers for next year's Republican National Convention in Tampa, Florida – has been negotiating with Haley and her political consultant to land the governor a coveted **prime time speaking gig** at the event.

Neither Haley nor Lerner returned messages seeking comment regarding those allegations. A spokesman for the Georgia Ports Authority was not immediately available for comment.

Regardless of the alleged political motivations, S.C. Sen. Larry Grooms (R- Berkeley County) said the DHEC decision would have disastrous consequences for South Carolina – both economically and environmentally.

"We will never be able to build a Jasper Ocean terminal, but they will be able to get larger ships to their port in Savannah," an exasperated Grooms told FITS. "We get all the negative environmental impact, we lose jobs and Georgia gains jobs – and our agency is responsible!"

Grooms said he was particularly concerned about unproven environmental technology that Georgia seeks to employ as part of its dredging project.

"They are altering the Savannah River forever," Grooms said.

Several other S.C. lawmakers – Democrats, "RINOs" and Republicans – expressed shock and revulsion at the decision.

"It was one thing when Georgia stabbed us in the back," one Lowcountry Democrat said, referring to Georgia's **recent abandonment** of a bi-state agreement for a Jasper Port. "It's another thing to get stabbed in the back by your own governor, your own state agency."

Haley's decision to hand Georgia the keys to its port expansion project – at the expense of a deepwater port in Jasper County, S.C. – is a sudden and stunning reversal of her prior rhetoric.

Shortly after her 2010 election, Haley instigated a major spat with Georgia – **sending a clear warning** across the Savannah River regarding port-related issues.

"You now have a governor who does not like to lose," Haley told a cheering crowd of S.C. State Ports Authority supporters in Charleston. "Georgia has had their way with us for way too long, and I don't have the patience to let it happen anymore."

Last month, though – right around the time that Georgia donors allegedly began stroking checks to her campaign – Haley's tune began to change.

"Every port is different, and every port has its challenges," Haley told Savannah's WJCL/FOX 28 last month. "We have to say 'What do we need to do that is right for the region?' Our goal is to make sure every port (in the region) is successful."

Wait ... what? We thought Haley's job was to promote *South Carolina's* best interests – particularly in light of our state's chronically-high **unemployment rate**, low **income levels**, **deteriorating competitiveness** and **recessionary economy**.

Grooms told FITS that lawmakers are already looking into allegations of foul play related to the DHEC decision.




"I was told that the DHEC staff was put under pressure to take another look at the project," Grooms said. "I don't know who put the pressure on them, but that's something I think we should find out."

DHEC ratifies Savannah port deal

Less than two months after denying a water-quality permit to dredge and deepen the Savannah port, the S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control board Thursday agreed to a deal finalized with Georgia officials just hours earlier.

The water-quality permit from a neighboring state with a competing port project just upstream was seen as a huge hurdle for the Savannah project. The DHEC staff denied the permit in late September, concerned about the impact of dredging on the environmental health of the river. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers appealed that decision to the DHEC board.

The morning that appeal was to be heard, DHEC staffers met with Corps of Engineers officials and leaders of the Savannah Ports Authority. They came up with an agreement to install devices called Speece cones, which pump oxygen into water to improve the environment for aquatic creatures. The deal also calls for either the Corps or Georgia to pay for the installation, operation and maintenance of the devices for up to 50 years, at an estimated price tag of \$1.2 million per year.

Georgia also agreed to pay for the protection of 1,500 acres of saltwater marsh in South Carolina and pledged to meet federal requirements to protect the endangered short-nosed sturgeon in the Savannah River.

DHEC lawyer John Harleston compared the river to a fence between the two states. "Good fences make good neighbors, and we feel we've taken good care of the fence with this agreement," he said.

The board agreed with him, voting unanimously to approve the deal. After the vote, chairman Allen Amsler said it's inaccurate to characterize the decision as a reversal of course for the agency. The staff presented issues in its original denial of the permit, and the deal resolved those issues, he said.

Others see it differently.

"DHEC sold the state out today," said state Sen. Larry Grooms, R-Berkeley. "It was ugly to see DHEC staffers congratulating the Georgia Ports Authority people for protecting jobs. These will be jobs for Georgia at the expense of South Carolina."

Grooms contends the Savannah port expansion is a death knell for the long-planned Jasper Ocean Terminal farther upstream in the river on the South Carolina side. It also will take away business from the Port of Charleston, he said.

Grooms felt the original denial of the permit was based on science, while the deal brokered Thursday smelled of political brokering.

"They called it a reasonable compromise," Grooms said. "Either the science works or it doesn't. You don't compromise on it."

Environmental leaders felt the economic issues might help them bolster support, especially from a new DHEC board appointed by Gov. Nikki Haley to be more business-friendly than past boards. Conservation groups were shocked at a board decision they see as devastating to both jobs and nature.

"If they can't deny this permit, they might as well shut the doors and return the money they get to run the agency to the taxpayers," said Patrick Moore, legislative director for the Coastal Conservation League. "This proves this agency is functionally incapable of protecting the environment."

Moore said Speece cones have been effective only in limited, small-scale operations. The 12 large Speece cones planned for the Savannah project can't be counted on to oxygenate several miles of impaired river, he said.

Also, conservation groups don't consider the wetlands swap originally planned by Georgia as an apples-to-apples deal. The wetlands that would be destroyed by the dredging operation are much more sensitive and rare than those proposed to be protected in South Carolina, Moore said.

Georgia and Corps of Engineers officials take the other side of the argument.

"We believe we have a resolution that protects the environment," said Col. Jeff Hall, commander of the Corps' Savannah District. "We struck the balance."

Curtis Foltz, executive director of the Georgia Ports Authority, said about 40 percent of the port workers will come from South Carolina, a reason for Palmetto State officials to cheer the approval.

"This is a river that needs to bring us together, not divide us," Foltz said.

Even if DHEC won't fight the port dredging, environmentalists will. The Coastal Conservation League plans to appeal the water-quality permit in administrative law court, Moore said.

The project also must clear additional federal procedural planning steps, and the portion of the deal paying for fisheries improvements must gain the approval of federal wildlife officials. Finally, the project would need to be funded by Congress.

Hall said the earliest the funding could come through would be 2013, and the project should take four to five years to build.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will take its case for deepening the Savannah River to a South Carolina state agency today.

At 10 a.m. in Columbia, the board of the S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control will hear why the corps thinks it should be granted a water quality permit. The S.C. agency's staffers in late September recommended a denial of both the water quality permit and a coastal zone consistency determination for the project, which could deepen the Savannah River from 42 to 48 feet to better accommodate the larger ships expected with the expansion of the Panama Canal in 2014.

All six board members were appointed by Gov. Nikki Haley, who has been hostile to Savannah's harbor deepening until recently.

"Georgia has had their way with us for way too long, and I don't have the patience to let it happen anymore," she told a group of S.C. state ports supporters shortly after she was elected last year.

But after meeting recently with Georgia Gov. Nathan Deal she's sounded a lot rosier about cooperating on "regional ports." That's prompted speculation they had struck a bargain.

"Georgia is our neighbor, and for that reason, Governor Haley and Governor Deal have had a lot to talk about – including ports issues," said Haley spokesman Rob Godfrey.

He declined to respond directly when asked if Haley had contacted board members about the issue.

In requesting today's review, Col. Jeffrey Hall, commander of the Savannah district, responded to each of DHEC's objections point by point in a 17-page letter. The board is expected to hear those same arguments today, said DHEC spokesman Adam Myrick.

"The board will allow a set amount time for each side to present its case," he said. "After that there's time for follow-up discussion, questions and clarification."

Georgia Ports Authority will be represented at the meeting and will "if time allows share our thoughts," said Executive Director Curtis Foltz.

"We remain optimistic that this will be accomplished as there is growing recognition that the region benefits from and requires improved infrastructure such as this going forward," he said.

Environmentalists have lined up in praise of DHEC's permit denial and are rooting for the board to back its professional staff.

"First of all, the agency made a very solid decision," said Dana Beach, executive director of the Coastal Conservation League. "The environmental impacts are substantial, and the strategies to remediate them unproven at best."

The DHEC staff is especially worried about the effectiveness, cost and reliability of a mechanical oxygen injection system the corps has proposed to restore depleted oxygen and prevent fish kills in the summer. The corps predicts it'll cost \$1.2 million a year to operate the giant conical bubblers along the river.

Late Wednesday, the Corps received a favorable biological opinion from NOAA Fisheries about the effect of the project on endangered shortnose sturgeon. The absence of that approval from NOAA had been one of DHEC's concerns when it denied the permit in late September.

Given the infighting within Carolina — interests aligned with the port of Charleston are opposed to rival Savannah's deepening, but those South Carolinians with jobs at the Savannah port support it — Beach predicts today's meeting will be "fascinating political theater."

But it may be theater without a message.

The corps has made it clear South Carolina's blessing would be nice, but it's not absolutely necessary.

"In the event of a State denial or the inclusion of unreasonable conditions, the Corps expressly reserves the right to proceed based on a Federal exemption and/or determination," Hall wrote in his Oct. 7 letter.
