Peeler's "Read to Succeed" bill.

BACKGROUND:

Education Initiative (from the Governor's notes)

Funding Formula

- Change by grade levels

- There are no losers
- Accounts for poverty
 - = 20% + per student free/reduced/Medicaid
 - = 20% more for low English proficiency
 - = more for individual learning = gifted & talented
 - = more for adult education, ages 17-21 pursuing degree on GED
- *will allow more \$ in classroom
- = 100 Million redirected in schools based on poverty

Reading

- 42nd among states 4th grades scoring at or above basic National Assessment
- Not reading by 3rd grade = 4x less likely to graduate

***\$30 million invested in reading**

- Reading coach in every elementary school
- **Summer camps - \$6 million**
 - FL found to increase proficiency substantially in 2 years
- **\$5 million professional development**

Technology

- Education technology has strong positive effects on student achievement

***1st in a multi-year commitment - \$30 million unprecedented investment in technology**

TALKING POINTS:

- We're gathered here today to celebrate literacy, and in a moment, I have a proclamation I'd like to issue. But first, I'd like to talk about our K-12 initiative.
- Last year, I traveled all around the state and met with teachers, parents, superintendents, education advocates, and legislators. We used what we learned during those meetings in order to put together a K-12 initiative that focuses on technology in the classroom, a fairer and simpler funding formula, and most importantly – literacy.
- My executive budget included nearly \$30 million in new, recurring funding for reading coaches and targeted those funds to the elementary schools that need it most.
- I want to thank Rep. Kenny Bingham – who chairs the K-12 subcommittee in the House Ways and Means Committee – for helping us to shape that K-12 initiative and for ensuring that it was included in the Ways and Means Committee's budget.
- **HAND-OFF TO BINGHAM** (Literacy, budget)
- Next week, the full House will take up the budget, and I hope they keep the momentum going.
- In the meantime, the Senate is already holding subcommittee meetings on the budget. They also have a bill that's been trapped on the calendar since last May that is absolutely crucial to improving literacy in South Carolina.
- Children who are not reading proficiently by the end of 3rd grade are four times less likely to graduate from high school on time than students who meet the standard.
- Studies have found that reading coaches "increase reading proficiency quite substantially" and that coaching likely has a greater impact in the lowest performing schools. The reading coaches we recommended in the budget and the "Read to Succeed" bill will go hand-in-hand in improving literacy in South Carolina.
- Yesterday, "Read to Succeed" was placed on Special Order by Sen. Peeler. That's very important progress and I hope the Senate can pass that bill soon.
- The K-12 initiative and "Read to Succeed" are about things we can start doing in order to improve literacy. But some people are already out there working on it now, and one of them is South Carolina's Teacher of the Year, Darlene Sutton. Darlene is a 1st grade teacher at Pickens Elementary School.
- Earlier today, Darlene was part of a group put together by Leadership South Carolina that announced a "Readers 2 Leaders" project that will bring public and private resources together to fight illiteracy. That group is trying to raise \$100,000 this year to:
 - Provide teachers with training on proven instructional methods, such as "Leveled Literacy Instruction"
 - Supply books and reading materials for students to take home
 - Increase statewide awareness of the harm that illiteracy causes and on the importance of early intervention
- In recognition of these efforts and to call attention to the importance of reading in every child's life, I'm declaring this "March into Literacy Month" in South Carolina.
