Nikki Haley to serve as U.S. ambassador to the United Nations and prominent charter school advocate Betsy DeVos as his secretary of education, the first women selected for top-level administration posts in his new administration. Both Cabinet-level positions require Senate confirmation. While some cheered Haley's selection, despite her limited experience on the international stage, the DeVos choice faced criticism even before it was formally announced Wednesday. Conservatives warned that DeVos, a longtime Republican donor, previously supported the Common Core education standards that Trump railed against during the campaign. Trump, who was at his Palm Beach estate Wednesday for the Thanksgiving holiday, called DeVos "a brilliant and passionate education advocate."

Donald Trump on Wednesday named South Carolina Governor Nikki Haley, a former critic with little foreign policy experience, to be the next U.S. ambassador to the United Nations at a time of uncertainty over America's international role under his presidency. Haley, one of two women chosen for a job in Trump's Cabinet, is "a proven dealmaker, and we look to be making plenty of deals. She will be a great leader representing us on the world stage," the Republican president-elect said in a statement. The 44-year-old daughter of Indian immigrants, Haley represents what some Republicans hope could be the new face of their party: a younger, more diverse generation of leaders. Haley took Trump strongly to task during the presidential campaign over his harsh rhetoric about illegal immigration and for not speaking forcefully enough against white supremacists. Trump has chosen mostly male conservatives so far for senior positions as he shapes his administration following his victory over Democrat Hillary Clinton in the Nov. 8 election. Trump takes over from Democratic President Barack Obama on Jan. 20.

President-elect Donald J. Trump named two prominent Republican women to cabinet posts on Wednesday, recruiting Betsy DeVos, a prominent Republican philanthropist and educational activist, as education secretary, and Gov. Nikki R. Haley of South Carolina as ambassador to the United Nations. Moving swiftly to diversify his cabinet, Mr. Trump was also nearing an announcement that Ben Carson, the retired neurosurgeon who ran an outsider's campaign for the Republican presidential nomination, as secretary of housing and urban development. Ms. DeVos and Ms. Haley would be the first women in Mr. Trump's cabinet, while Mr. Carson would be the first African-American. Ms. Haley is Indian-American and a rising star in Republican politics. But none of these choices suggest a president-elect who is reaching beyond reliably conservative circles for his major policy makers.

Gov. Nikki R. Haley of South Carolina is the daughter of immigrants, favors free markets and global trade, and earned international attention for speaking out against the Confederate battle flag in the aftermath of the 2015 massacre at a black church in Charleston. During Donald J. Trump's presidential campaign, she sharply criticized his demeanor and warned what it might mean for American diplomacy — even suggesting that his tendency to lash out at critics could cause a world war. But on Wednesday, Mr. Trump named Ms. Haley as his choice for ambassador to the United Nations, a move that will most likely serve to both assuage and confound the president-elect's critics, raising questions about the tone and direction of his foreign policy. She would also add ethnic and gender diversity to the appointments, so far predominantly white men, he has made to other top posts in the administration. In a statement, Ms. Haley said she had accepted Mr. Trump's offer because she felt good about South Carolina's economic standing under her leadership. She added that this month's elections had brought "exciting changes to America."

President-elect Donald Trump has chosen the first women for posts in his administration, picking South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley to serve as the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations and school-choice advocate Betsy DeVos as his secretary of education, his transition team said Wednesday. Ms. Haley long held reservations about Mr. Trump's candidacy during the GOP primary, and endorsed both Sens. Marco Rubio and Ted Cruz during the primary. U.N. ambassador is a key post, advising the White House on foreign policy issues and representing the U.S. in discussions with other countries. Ms. DeVos, 58 years old, a former Michigan Republican Party chairwoman, would enter the office when traditional public schools are fighting charter schools for students, as enrollment drives state and local funding. Some school districts, including the Los Angeles Unified School District, have reported losing thousands of students and millions of dollars.

Mitt Romney, former New York City mayor Rudy Giuliani and a handful of others among those still in the running for the top diplomat position.

Gov. Nikki Haley has developed a national reputation as a racial conciliator who led the charge to bring down the Confederate flag at the Statehouse and guided South Carolina through one of its darkest moments, the massacre at a black church. South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley (R) hasn't always held Donald Trump in the highest regard. Back in January, when the governor delivered her party's response to the State of the Union address, Haley took a not-so-subtle shot at the then-frontrunner for the GOP's presidential nomination – much to the consternation of the Republican base. Nikki Haley is about to become a major player in Donald Trump's reset with Russia. As word spread Wednesday that the president-elect had chosen the South Carolina governor as his ambassador to the United Nations, some observers saw it as a sign that Trump will abide by his pledge to cooperate more with Moscow. Haley is not a flame-thrower and has no notable track record on foreign policy, suggesting she'll follow Trump's lead. In announcing his pick, Trump praised Haley as a “deal-maker, and we look to be making plenty of deals.” But at the United Nations, Haley will be tested like she's never been tested before on urgent matters of life and death — issues on which Russia, with its experienced ambassador, Vitaly Churkin, has long been America's main foil. Case in point: The U.S. has spent months, to no avail, urging Russia to support sanctions on the Syrian government over its use of chemical weapons. If Haley gives up on that fight and others, it may appease the Russians, but it also could concern Britain and France, America's traditional allies on the Security Council.

South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley, who is a daughter of Indian immigrants and has no experience in international affairs, has been chosen by President-elect Donald Trump to become the U.S. ambassador to the United Nations, a key forum for articulating and advancing U.S. foreign policy.

Haley, 44, a former state lawmaker who has been governor for six years, has not served in the federal government before, and her overseas work has been limited to international trade missions on behalf of her state. But she would be considered a moderating voice among Trump's national security picks and someone who would bring polished political and communications skills to the world body. It is unusual for an incoming administration to name a U.N. ambassador so early, especially before the nominee for secretary of state is decided. Presidents Ronald Reagan, Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Obama did not name ambassadors until after their inaugurations. By naming Haley so quickly, Trump seems to be signaling that he considers the post an important podium for his foreign policy agenda.

South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley will be President-elect Donald Trump's ambassador to the United Nations, a body that stands in stark contrast to many of Trump's stated foreign policies. Haley, who spoke out frequently against Trump during his campaign, has no foreign policy experience. She is the child of Indian immigrants and rejected Trump's suggested ban of Muslims entering the U.S., calling it "un-American." Although she supported Sen. Marco Rubio, R-Fla., in the primaries, Haley calls Trump "a friend" and met with him last week to discuss a possible place in his administration. Trump has proposed shrinking the American role in the NATO alliance and similarly reducing the U.S. role in the U.N., where the Americans are one of five countries with a permanent seat on the Security Council. "Same thing, smaller numbers," Trump said on the campaign trail of his U.N. policy. Although Trump's views may continue to evolve on some foreign policy topics, there are a few issues Haley will have to deal with in representing the U.S. in the U.N.

South Carolina Governor Nikki Haley to be his ambassador to the United Nations, President-elect Donald Trump is taking a page from history. South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley has declared a state of emergency in Pickens and Greenville counties because of a growing wildfire in the mountains. Officials say it started about two weeks ago and is just over a third contained. The South Carolina Forestry Commission says 250 firefighters are fighting the blaze and 60 more are trying to clear out dead leaves and branches in front of the fire to try and stop it from spreading. The area is in an exceptional drought and there is only a slight chance of rain through the Thanksgiving weekend.

A defense witness testified Wednesday that it appears Walter Scott threw a Taser as he confronted Michael Slager seconds before the North Charleston patrolman shot Scott five times in the back fleeing a traffic stop. Slager, who was fired after release of a dramatic cellphone video of the April 2015 shooting that stunned the nation, is on trial for murder. The 50-year-old Scott, who was unarmed, was black. Slager is white. The defense has been building a case that the men struggled over control of Slager's Taser just before the shooting. Eugene Liscio of Toronto, Canada, an expert in 3D reconstruction of crime scenes, recreated the scene of the Scott shooting that occurred in a vacant lot. He used the cellphone video taken by a bystander and laser scans of the area. The technology allows the scene to be shifted, much like scenes in a video game, so the viewer can see what happened from different perspectives.

A defense witness has testified it appears Walter Scott threw a Taser as he confronted a patrolman seconds before he was shot running from a traffic stop. Eugene Liscio of Toronto, Canada, testified Wednesday in the murder trial of Michael Slager, the former South Carolina patrolman charged in the April 2015 shooting. The slaying of the unarmed black motorist was captured on cellphone video that stunned the nation. Liscio made a 3D re-creation of the crime scene using laser scans and video frames. He testified that just before the shooting the Taser is seen falling to the ground. At that time, he said, Slager's left hand was grabbing Scott's wrist while his right hand was going for his gun in its holster. The defense contends the two men struggled over the stun gun seconds before Scott was shot. Court recessed at noon Wednesday for the Thanksgiving holiday.

A 3-D animation offered jurors Wednesday a glimpse of what officer Michael Slager might have seen when he took aim at Walter Scott. It conveyed a point Slager's defense lawyers had wanted to make since his murder trial began: that Scott's shooting death must be viewed through the policeman's eyes. "It provides you with a different view and a different perspective," said Canadian crime-scene mapper Eugene Liscio, who created the presentation. The witness had matched three-dimensional scans of the North Charleston site with a bystander's video that captured Slager firing eight times after Scott freed himself from the confrontation and started running away. But the most crucial part of the display was what happened before Scott fell into the lawman's sights: Liscio's implication that Scott had the officer's Taser. Slager reported that Scott's taking of the device prompted his gunfire in self-defense, and the claim remains the heart of his defense in court. Liscio declined, though, to state the contention as fact.

ON TUESDAY, GOV. Nikki Haley asked us all to pray for South Carolina, which has faced and continues to face significant challenges. Today, we all need to pray for Gov. Haley, as she prepares

for a very different and very difficult challenge. There's a lot of distance between Thanksgiving and Ambassador Haley. And there's no guarantee that the Senate, even a Republican Senate, will confirm someone with no foreign policy experience, much less diplomatic experience, as ambassador to the United Nations. Although it isn't our most important foreign policy position, it is extremely important. And frankly, it's a stretch. For all that President-elect Donald Trump and the governor's supporters say about her deal-making prowess, we've only seen that on display in deals between corporations that wanted to locate in our state and a state that wanted those corporations to locate here. The challenge she has met, in other words, was coming up with a deal between two parties that wanted to make a deal. That's very different than the challenges facing a UN ambassador. We certainly hope that her talents can translate to this new role, but we simply don't know because she is untested.

Despite imminent risk of fire or explosion, Marine Capt. Trey Kennedy raced through flying debris to help rescue four victims of a NATO helicopter crash in Afghanistan a year ago, an act that has earned him the Navy and Marine Corps Medal for Heroism, the highest non-combat decoration awarded for heroism by the two branches of military service. Kennedy, a Clemson and Wren High School graduate, will be honored in a ceremony before Clemson's rivalry game with South Carolina on Saturday and presented with the medal on the field during the game, according to the Marines. The citation describes how Kennedy risked his life to save four others in the helicopter crash in Kabul on Oct. 11, 2015. "Standing in several inches of jet fuel, Capt. Kennedy was able to reach through the window to remove a passenger's seatbelt, then moved back inside to pull him out the passenger door," it says. "He freed another passenger and handed her out of the helicopter, then discovered at least one more responsive passenger trapped in the wreckage.

Pickens County improperly used more than \$60,000 donated to the county museum for other county purposes, but the state Attorney General's Office elected not to pursue criminal charges because county officials didn't know what they were doing was wrong, according to the investigation report obtained under the state Freedom of Information Act. For months, the county has maintained that it didn't improperly divert museum funds to the county's general fund. An investigation by the State Law Enforcement Division, however, found that county officials believed museum donations could be used for any county purpose unless a donor listed a specific museum project or program on their check,

according to the investigation report. "I have reviewed (the SLED report) and do believe approximately \$60,000 in charitable donations given with restricted use was used for non-designated purposes by Pickens County, as these donations were restricted for museum purposes," Assistant Attorney General Jason Anders wrote in a memo attached to the SLED report obtained by The News. Investigators, according to the report, reviewed financial records dating from 2013 to 2015.

The Beaufort County School District will audit its disciplinary services to determine why black students are suspended and expelled at higher rates than their white peers. Statistics released last weekend showed the gap has gotten worse in recent years, and alarmed some district leaders who quickly pushed for more research into the problem. Superintendent Jeff Moss, who agreed to the audit at a Student Services Committee meeting on Tuesday, said achieving consistent discipline has been a priority of his first two years here, and that he's not yet satisfied with the results. "I can see some of the same behaviors are not receiving the same consequences," Moss said. "We still have some more refining to do, and we're in the process of doing those things, whether with the

(disciplinary) hearing officer or drilling down to exactly what occurs in schools.”

After Ivanka Trump appeared on CBS's "60 Minutes" wearing a \$10,800 bracelet from her jewelry line, someone at her company sent photos from the interview to fashion writers to drum up free publicity. A firestorm of criticism erupted over the impropriety of profiting off the presidency, and the company apologized. If only the bracelet brouhaha was the end of it. Experts on government ethics are warning President-elect Donald Trump that he'll never shake suspicions of a clash between his private interests and the public good if he doesn't sell off his vast holdings, which include roughly 500 companies in more than a dozen countries. They say just the appearance of conflicts is likely to tie up the new administration in investigations, lawsuits and squabbles, stoked perhaps by angry Oval Office tweets. "People are itching to sue Donald Trump and stick him under oath," said Richard Painter, chief White House ethics lawyer for George W. Bush.

Associated Press: China rebuffs Trump threat to take steps to win trade edge

China pushed back Wednesday against President-elect Donald Trump's threat to use sanctions to win back a competitive trade advantage for the United States. On the campaign trail, Trump had threatened to slap 45 percent tariffs on Chinese products and to label China a "currency manipulator." But Zhang Xiangchen, China's deputy trade representative, warned that Trump will find he is bound by the rules of the World Trade Organization, which restrain countries from imposing sanctions without making a persuasive case for them. China can challenge any sanctions at the WTO. Speaking at the end of annual U.S.-China trade talks, Zhang also disputed the idea that China keeps its currency artificially low to give its exporters a price advantage. Many economists agree that China no longer manipulates its currency, the yuan. At the meeting, the United States and China agreed to continue working on vexing issues such as China's overproduction of steel. U.S. Trade Rep. Michael Froman stressed the importance of keeping the commercial relationship with China "on as even a keel as possible."

Associated Press: Thanksgiving travel expected to be heaviest since 2007

Elizabeth Thompson can't wait to leave the big city behind and decompress over the Thanksgiving holiday at her grandmother's house in rural south-central Indiana. But first she has to get there. On Wednesday, Thompson, 23, missed her Amtrak train from Chicago to Galesburg, Illinois, where she'd planned to catch a ride with a family member the rest of the way to Edinburgh, Indiana. "It's just where we go to unplug and escape," said Thompson, who had to decide whether to wait several hours for the next train or hop on a bus and get going.
