A large fire at Windsor Green in Carolina Forest has caused "significant damage" and touched numerous buildings, burning some to the ground. Plumes of black smoke were sent billowing into the evening sky. Burning buildings could be heard crackling from hundreds of feet away as they were consumed. Horry County Fire Rescue responded to the fire around 5 p.m. Spokeswoman Leslie Yancey said it began as a brush fire, then spread quickly into neighboring condos and single family dwellings. There has been "significant loss," Yancey said, but no injuries have been reported. Firefighters are still battling the blaze, but it has been "contained to one area," Yancey said.
