The endorsement game is in full swing here, with prominent South Carolinians playing hype man for their candidates at rallies from Clemson to Charleston. But there are a couple of politicians whose support is coveted and unpledged, including Gov. Nikki Haley, an energetic campaigner with an 80% approval rating among likely Republican primary voters, according to a December poll by Winthrop University.

Note: A week ago, Ms. Haley said she was within days of deciding whether to endorse a candidate in the Feb. 20 GOP primary: "It's fair to say that this week I'm thinking really hard about whether I should, who I would, what that would look like," she said in a Feb. 3 interview. "I'm talking about it every night with Michael [her husband], we're in that mode."

Associated Press: House bill provides \$40M in aid to flood-devastated farmers

South Carolina farmers devastated by last fall's flooding could get up to \$40 million in state aid to stay afloat under legislation advanced Wednesday to the House floor. The legislation approved 21-0 by the Ways and Means Committee allows farmers in disaster-declared counties to apply for grants of up to \$100,000 each. The grants could equal 20 percent of a farmer's total loss.

Note: In December, hundreds of farmers packed the Statehouse to beg Gov. Nikki Haley to ask for federal money to offset losses. But the Republican governor has refused, saying farmers shouldn't be treated differently than other businesses beyond what's already available, such as subsidized flood insurance.

The State: House panel approves \$40 million in flood aid for farmers

The S.C. House's budget panel approved using \$40 million from a reserve account Wednesday to offer state aid to farmers whose crops were washed away during October's historic flooding. If approved, farmers could recover up to 20 percent of their loss — up to \$100,000 — via a grant, money that would not have to be repaid

Note: Farm groups have urged Gov. Nikki Haley to request assistance for farmers from the state's congressional delegation. But Haley's office has balked, saying the request is for direct cash payments to farmers who chose to be underinsured. Haley is asking the federal government for \$140 million to repair flood-damaged housin
