Trout of Southern Appalachia

Trout are found in mountain streams and lakes throughout Southern Appalachia. These aquatic habitats provide cold, clear, oxygen-rich water required for trout to survive.



Brook Trout, *Salvelinus fontinalis*, is the only trout native to Southern Appalachia. They are often called "spring darters" because of the pale, blue, brown, and green on their lower bodies. Their lower bodies are well marked with black stripes and a fading edge of blue.



The Rainbow Trout, *Oncorhynchus mykiss*, is the most adaptable of North American native trout. It gets its name from the colorful pink, blue, and red bands running along the side of its body. Although found in some areas, they more prefer cool, sulfidated streams.



The Brown Trout, *Salmo trutta*, is a species of European origin. The fish was first introduced to the United States in 1859. Initially, it was a common sight in the mountains and had a high survival rate with only a few fish
