## Lenten Rose

In perennial guru Allan Armitage's tome, *Herbaceous Perennial Plants; a treatise on their identification, culture, and garden attributes*, he writes: "Unless hardiness is an issue, no garden should be without hellebores. Period!"

The budding and blooming of hellebores herald the dawn of a new season. Strolling by a clump of hellebores on the edge of a path or on a hillside where flowers nod their greetings, the stroller knows that spring has sprung and all is right with the world."

Despite their ominous-sounding name, hellebores are outstanding evergreen herbaceous perennials that are well-suited for partially to fully shaded areas of the landscape. Their claim to fame is their nodding bell-shaped flowers that, depending on the species and cultivar, may appear as early as Halloween and as late as April or early May.

The most popular hellebores are actually hybrids comprised of several different species. The parentage is a bit fuzzy, so taxonomists identify them with the scientific name of *Helleborus xhybridus*. Everyone else knows them as Lenten roses. Throughout the year they look like two-foot high umbrellas with slender, evergreen leathery leaves divided into 7 to 9 segments. The clumps grow 18 to 24 inches high and 24- to 30-inches wide.

Their show-stopping flowers range in color from pure white to ivory, cream, lemon and chartreuse. Other Lenten roses bear one-inch wide flowers that range in color from pale pink, rose, dusky purple, to near black. They may be single, semi-double, or double flowers. Often the flowers last up to two months. It's not uncommon for mature plants to produce 50 or more flowers, which often give rise to numerous seedlings that can be moved or left in place to increase the size of your planting.

Lenten roses require little care. Plant them in shade and water them occasionally in the summer.

It's one of my top ten herbaceous perennials, partly because of its rugged disposition, but primarily because of its inviting wintertime flowers that help me cope with the cold, dreary days of this season.

## “Hang Down Your Head, Tom Dooley”

Before it was a hugely popular song by The Kingston Trio, it was a real story about love, mystery and murder in North Carolina.

Though the stories vary, the ending is concrete: Tom Dula (pronounced locally as Dooley), a Confederate soldier known to be a ladies’ man, was hanged for the murder of 18-year-old Laura Foster, a young woman with whom he was involved. The passed-down stories from the Wilkes County mystery reveal a love triangle and rumors of deceit, though what actually happened may never be known.

A family member of one of Dula’s captors co-wrote the story into a folk song, which was made popular years later by The Kingston Trio. Tour the historical sites in the High Country to watch the legend come to life on stage and to experience pieces of the puzzle that led Dula to his fate.

## **An amazing dog you've probably never seen**

### **North Carolina's State Dog**

I was walking through a big box pet store when I saw him. Muscular build, handsome face, friendly demeanor. I inquired and the proud owner responded, "He's a Plott Hound – state dog of North Carolina."

And so I did some research. Seems this creature is one of only a few breeds developed in the U.S.

Hunting experts recognize the Plott Hound as one of the premier hunting dogs in America. Named after the original breeder, German-born Johannes Plott, the dog was brought to the U.S. in 1750. The family bred the dogs, which became quite popular. The Plotts eventually settled in Haywood County, NC.

Known for fierce hunting ability for large game including bear and boar, the dogs are equally known for their gentleness within the family. They are very happy in rural areas, and extremely loyal to their human companions.

Usually about 50 pounds, they have distinctive brindle markings, however can be all black or other distinctive colors. The great-great-grandson of Johannes Plott has written a book about his family's breed.
