The chairman of the battered state Democratic Party, whose candidates suffered a string of defeats this week, says Democrats will have to find a way to inspire voters to win future state elections. Jaime Harrison, the state party's first African-American chairman, told The Greenville News that his party must reach more than African-Americans in the state to be successful.

**Note:** Democratic Senator Vincent Sheheen, in his first 2010 matchup with Haley, came within 4.5 points of Haley, collecting 630,534 votes. Tuesday night, however, Haley beat Sheheen by 14 points and the Democrat collected 115,000 fewer votes than in 2010.

Gov. Nikki Haley had to prove herself to South Carolina voters to earn her 14-point re-election victory Tuesday. Haley was a new face on the S.C. political scene when first elected four years ago and remained a relative unknown when she took the oath of office in January 2011.

**Stealing an issue from Democrats:** By earlier this year, the improving post-recession economy had bolstered state tax collections, and Haley had a plan to spend some of that money. In January, Haley unveiled an education initiative that included more reading coaches, new technology and more state money for poorer schools.

Nikki Haley came to rural, poor Barnwell County and seven others like it during her first term, bringing job fairs, medical screenings and free vaccines as part of her charitable foundation. Some places it appears to have made a big difference at the ballot box Tuesday. Other places, she gained little.

**Note:** None of the counties Haley visited responded better than Union County, which voted 57 percent for Haley in 2014, compared to 44 percent in 2010. Haley also made significant gains of 7 percentage points in Dillon County and 4 percentage points in Marlboro County.
