Six years after it moved much of its pharmaceuticals production to Lancaster, Nutramax Laboratories Inc. will spend \$15 million to expand that presence and bring another 125 jobs to the S.C. city. The company, which makes pills and chewable vitamins and supplements for animals and humans, will buy an existing 138,000-square-foot building on the east side of Lancaster.

Note: S.C. Gov. Nikki Haley says Nutramax's expansion in the state convinced her to demand only the company's products for the new family dog, Bentley. "I want to thank you all because you did bring jobs" to South Carolina, Haley told the approximately 75 attending the announcement this morning.

Rick Todd, president and CEO of the S.C. Trucking Association, says state lawmakers need to commit at least \$800 million a year to pay for road maintenance and expansion. That would equate to an increase of 12 cents a gallon in the state's gas tax. Todd said one-time money is not a solution.

Note: Gov. Nikki Haley has recommended spending \$345 million on roads, which includes \$231 million in

one-time money and \$49 million from the first phase of a 10-cent increase in the state's 16.75-cent-a-gallon gas tax.
