After 4-6 weeks, the caterpillars will cocoon over winter to emerge as a small white moth in the spring. Webworms like persimmon, cherry, and especially sourwood leaves but do not seem to harm healthy trees. Now you know!

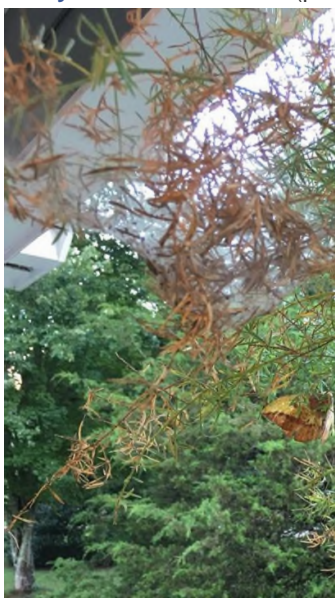

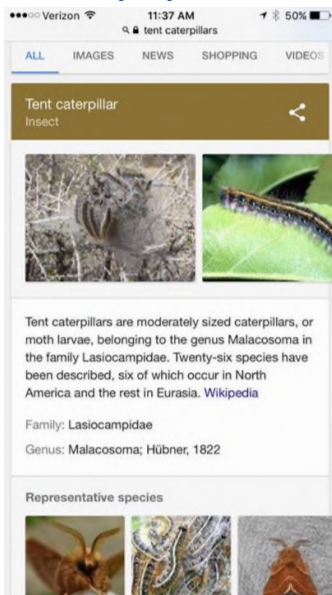
