A new law meant to keep guns out of the hands of the mentally ill has so far stopped 55 attempted handgun sales and caused 65 concealed weapon permits to be revoked, the chief of the State Law Enforcement Division said Friday. The law approved last year ordered courts across South Carolina to send SLED their records on residents who have been declared mentally ill or involuntarily committed to a mental institution.
