Not sure I would characterize this as a plan surfacing. More like an application to be included in a thought project.

DOE issued an "Invitation for Public Comment" on December 23, 2015 requesting feedback from communities, states, tribes, and other interested stakeholders on "elements to consider in the design of a consent-based siting process" for a permanent nuclear waste facility. DOE kicked off this conversation because, to date, they have been unable to establish a permanent facility for nuclear waste (Yucca mountain and WIPP being the two closest). The final report will be released in December 2016 for the process of "developing a draft consent-based siting process." Again, this is not to select a facility, but to design a process to "serve as a framework for collaborating with potentially interested host communities" leading to an eventual siting of a facility.

According to DHEC, this is just one of many requests from different companies across the country to try and get in on what would be a huge federal project, and I assume SC would not be an ideal place to establish a deep geologic disposal site.

All that being said, I have not spoken with Governor Haley about this, but have to assume she would be opposed to SC actually becoming a permanent dumping ground for nuclear waste, seeing as how we are opposed to the defacto permanent status we currently hold.

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A plan has surfaced to establish a new nuclear waste disposal ground in South Carolina.

An organization called the Spent Fuel Reprocessing Group wants approval to open the site in the Barnwell area near the Savannah River Site nuclear weapons complex. The material would be moved from the state's three nuclear power plant sites and stored indefinitely at the new facility, records show.

The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission received notice from the group in July of the plan.
