**WHNS:** SC lawmakers want to see increase in teacher pay

Last week, Governor Nikki Haley introduced plans to reform education in South Carolina with a \$160 million cash infusion. But critics of her plan from both parties say one crucial component was missing from the proposal: teacher salaries. South Carolina has some of the lowest teacher salaries in the nation according to the national education association.

**Note:** "Last year they got pay increases, I think the year before there may have been some pay increases," Haley said. "So it's not a given, it's not every year we have to do it."

Our thoughts and prayers are with the family, and we're going to do everything we can to help this family find their daughter."

Funding education and figuring out ways to spend a projected \$429 million of new revenue coming into South Carolina - the result of an improving economy - will be major issues for the SC General Assembly. But when the state legislature convenes this week, 2014 also could be the year lawmakers shake up the state's transportation administration, and possibly let go of opposition to Medicaid expansion.

**Note:** Haley will be front and center with the legislature, also. In addition to last week's announcement of her major education initiative, the Governor will release an executive budget - her blueprint for spending state money - and make her constitutionally-required State of the State address.

With nearly half a billion in funds secured, state Sen. Hugh K. Leatherman said Friday that road projects from the first penny sales tax are progressing and construction will begin soon after "battling to get permits" from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. Speaking to the media during a press conference on Friday, Leatherman said that once the roads funded by the first Capital Projects Sales Tax (known as the penny sales tax) are complete, they will benefit residents of the county by attracting companies to the area as well as increase safety for drivers.

A former employee of South Carolina's unemployment agency says in a lawsuit filed this week that the department's director fabricated allegations that she improperly downloaded personal information to force her out. Agency officials say she downloaded personal data of thousands of current and former employees and their children and beneficiaries onto a personal flash drive.

The hospitals include AnMed Health in Anderson, Baptist Easley, Bon Secours St. Francis Health System, Cannon Memorial Hospital in Pickens, Greenville Health System and County Memorial Hospital. The flu has claimed 30 lives around the state since Sept. 29, according to the state Department of Health and Environmental Control.

The city of North Myrtle Beach has gotten \$1.25 million from the state Department of Health and Environmental Control to go toward the \$9.5 million cost of the Main Street ocean outfall project. State Rep. Tracy Edge, R-North Myrtle Beach, said in an email late Thursday afternoon that his efforts were critical in getting the money. The city has the money in hand, and city spokesman Pat Dowling said it will be added to another \$3 million in state money for the project. Edge said he snagged the first state funding for the city in 2008.

South Carolina ranked 24th in the United States for population growth, with an estimated year-to-year increase of 51,000 people. Aiken County has seen its own growth spurt over the past 10 years, with nearly 20,000 more people added to the census. In 2002, Aiken County's population was about 144,700, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. That number jumped to 162,812 by 2012. Both the populations of the cities of Aiken and North Augusta increased by more than 3,000 people between 2002 to 2012.

Wayne Clegg spent Christmas Eve clicking through [www.healthcare.gov](http://www.healthcare.gov) with his sister in Rock Hill. Three hours and a phone call later, he successfully enrolled in a silver-level health insurance plan, which will cover 70 percent of his medical costs. "I finally got through," said Clegg, 44, who will gain coverage for the first time in nearly a decade. "I'm excited." Clegg is one of more than 24,000 state residents who signed up for insurance on the federal health exchange website from Oct. 1 to Dec. 28, according to statistics released recently by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

State highway officials say the new S.C. Highway 41 bridge over the Wando River will be designed so pedestrians and bicyclists also can use it. But Lowcountry cycling advocates and other elected officials say there's a big difference between the bike and pedestrian access currently envisioned for the bridge — and what should be built. That issue — and the lingering debate over whether the new bridge should be 55 feet tall or only 35 feet tall — is coming to a head right as the state Department of Transportation prepares to

sign a design-build contract next month.

**Associated Press:** Citi laying off hundreds in Fort Mill

Citi is closing a unit at its Fort Mill operation, eliminating hundreds of jobs. The financial company is closing its default mortgage service unit, which could affect up to half of its approximately 850 employees in the Fort Mill area, The Herald of Rock Hill reported. Citi public affairs director Mark Rodgers says about 200 workers will be laid off during the first quarter of this year. Affected employees were told this week, the same time it was announced that Citi had sold its mortgage servicing rights for about 64,000 Fannie Mae residential mortgage loans, with an outstanding balance of about \$10 billion.
