

The Administration's FY19 budget request was released Feb. 12. It recommends eliminating or cutting more than a dozen programs or initiatives vital to the health and economic security of seniors. Few major policy changes are expected to pass in this election year, but we're watching closely as Congress starts the FY19 process and finalizes FY18 funding.
