### Medicaid & CHIP: Applications, Determinations, & Enrollment

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) released their monthly report for October 2016 on Medicaid and CHIP application, eligibility determination, and enrollment data. States provide data to CMS on factors related to key application, eligibility and enrollment processes using the Medicaid and CHIP Performance Indicator Project. The data is then used to inform CMS on the operations of the programs in each state and to share state performance data publicly.

## Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services

### CMS Issues Guidance to States on Community First Choice

On December 30, 2016, The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) issued a State Medicaid Director (SMD) letter with guidance to the state Medicaid directors about the implementation of Community First Choice (CFC) State Plan Option. The CFC State Plan Option is a home and community-based (HCBS) benefit package available to states as an effort to promote integration in the community. Included in the letter are links to the state plan amendment (SPA) pre-print and technical guide for CFC. The technical guide provides detailed guidance regarding the different sections of the SPA pre-print, as well as the criteria that CMS will use to review and approve CFC amendments.

Of note, the SMD letter and associated guidance provide clarification of a couple of key issues related to the implementation and operation of the CFC. First, the letter provides guidance regarding the regulatory requirement stating that unpaid supports cannot be required as a replacement for paid LTSS. CMS clarifies that this requirement does not force states to reimburse for previously unpaid care or to exceed the authorized hours of care. Instead, the provision means that unpaid supports cannot be compelled as a condition of CFC. CMS also provides guidance on the availability of CFC service and administrative matching funds. CMS also clarifies the ability to offer CFC-like services through 1115 demonstrations, but notes that states can only secure the 6% increase in Federal matching funds via an approved CFC SPA. Additionally, the technical guide provides information about standard questions that will be asked of all CFC applications regarding the settings where CFC services are provided. These questions are to ensure that the settings meet the integration requirements included in the HCBS final rule.

### CMS Releases RFI Regarding PACE-Like Models of Care

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) released a Request for Information (RFI) to gather information for the possible development of a model test under the PACE Innovation Act of 2015 (PIA). The RFI seeks comment about the elements of a PACE-like model test and types of technical assistance that organizations and states would require for "individuals dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid, age 21 and older, with

disabilities that impair their mobility and who are assessed as requiring a nursing home level of care and meet other eligibility criteria." Additionally, the RFI seeks comments about any additional populations whose health outcomes could benefit from enrollment in the PACE-like models and ways the PACE model could be adapted to serve these populations. CMS is seeking feedback from all interested parties. All comments must be submitted by **5:00 p.m. ET on February 10, 2017**. # Senate & House of Representatives

## Congress Reconvenes and Begins ACA Repeal Process

On January 3rd, the House and Senate reconvened after the end of the year recess and swore in newly elected members for the 115th Congressional session. Shortly after swearing in, the Republican majority began the process of fulfilling their campaign promises to repeal the Affordable Care Act. The first step was the introduction and passage of a budget resolution, which establishes the framework for the parliamentary process known as reconciliation. Under reconciliation, the Senate can pass measures with a direct impact on spending and/or revenue with a simple majority instead of the 60 votes generally required in the chamber.

The House passed its resolution on Tuesday, while the Senate made a procedural vote on Wednesday that will allow a final vote on the resolution next week. After passage of the budget resolution, leadership in both chambers will begin the process of developing specific language that repeals portions of the ACA. As such, the breadth and scope of the repeal as well as the effective date of such changes remain unknown. Democrats have begun messaging regarding the potential harms of the bill in order to develop grassroots opposition to ACA repeal. Democrats have also expressed hope that they may be able to use procedural maneuvers and rules regarding reconciliation to delay the legislation and to limit parts of the ACA that are impacted.

However, the minority party is unlikely to prevent legislation from becoming law as Republican control of both chambers means that the majority party can pass the reconciliation package without any Democratic support.
