

As a concerned citizen of the growing Lancaster County population, there is one BIG problem I would like to address, which is our public transportation. This affected my family personally when my grandmother was offered jobs at multiple establishments and was not able to accept the job offer due to lack of transportation. Her only means of transportation is my mother who has a full time job. My grandmother's schedule didn't correspond with my mother's schedule, so she had to give up the job. At age 64 it is very hard for my grandmother to find a job so she was extremely happy to have finally found a job, but was disappointed when she found out that it didn't fit my mother's schedule. We should motivate and encourage our elders to take opportunities while staying physically and mentally active.

LARS transportation is the only means of transportation here in the Lancaster county, and are only for those who are eligible. The transportation system has a couple major flaws, for instance, due to their low budget, LARS can only transfer people for medical purposes. LARS needs to extend their services to business transportation also. The only day of the week when the LARS bus comes to Indian Land is on Friday and the working hours are 9am to 3pm. There are 4 other buisness days to accommodate for. Working hours are usually much earlier than 9am and later than 3pm, so I think that the transportation bus hours should be extended to around 5am to 11pm, which is a reasonable time. The LARS transportation system doesn't work on the holidays which includes, New Year's Day , Martin Luther King Jr. Day, President's Day, Easter Friday, Easter Monday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, day after Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Christmas Eve. Some people are required to work on some of those days but don't have any means transportation. So in conclusion, I hope you consider these ideas pertaining to the problems of public transportation.

In Indian Land, South Carolina, more and more neighborhoods are being built. With the increasing number of neighborhoods, there will be more and more children coming into the schools. Our schools are already crowded. The additional students from more neighborhoods will cause problems and safety issues in the schools.

We have two elementary schools, one middle school, and one high school. One of the elementary schools has only been open for two years and it is already at full capacity with some students in mobile units. The school district is expanding the middle school this year. With the increasing population, we should go ahead and expand the high school and make plans to build another high school and middle school.

At the beginning of this school year, our school, Indian Land Middle School, did not have enough room for all the sixth graders. There were students sitting in the hallway eating lunch and that is unacceptable. There are thirty students in all of our classes. That seems fine until you actually think about it the amount of space needed and the amount of time the teacher can spend with students needing help. In Art class, we have thirty students and we have no room to work. There is very little space for us to work on our projects. The school's Science Lab had to be turned into a classroom. This is not acceptable since we have to dissect things for the class. We are having to do that in our regular classroom that doesn't have all the equipment a lab needs. Plus, this makes our class room smell horrible.

Additional students also cause problems outside of the classrooms. With more students coming into the school, that means more students are riding the bus. On a normal day we are usually sitting three to a seat. We usually have more than one bus not running, so we have students from those buses split onto other buses. Then we have way too many students on the bus, which is not safe at all.

All of these things are happening because there are too many students in the school now. This problem is going to keep getting worse with more and more neighborhoods being built in Indian Land. No more neighborhoods need to be built until we build more schools and fix the crowding and safety issues fixed. Our government should not allow more neighborhoods to be built until we have enough space for the students we have now and the additional students that will come when the new neighborhoods are complete.

As an eighth grade student at Indian Land Middle School, I have noticed that the amount of students in our school system is growing rapidly. The amount of students is increasing annually and our schools are very close to reaching their capacities, if they have not already reached capacity.

Since I live directly across the street from Harrisburg Elementary School, I have seen firsthand how many cars drive through the carpool and how many students pour out of the buses every morning. In only its second year open Harrisburg Elementary School is at its full capacity, already having to add multiple mobiles. When Harrisburg opened two years ago, many students that attended Indian Land Elementary School transferred to Harrisburg because of convenience, especially students of residence in the neighborhood of Bridgehampton. The transfer of so many students leaves Indian Land with much more room than it had prior to the opening of Harrisburg Elementary, which allows for more students to be transferred to Indian Land. In addition to the increased population of schools, new developments are being built to allow for the increasing population. These new developments could be rezoned, granting families with children that move into these developments the opportunity to attend Indian Land Elementary instead of Harrisburg.

Although rezoning these new developments may cause some of these new students to be separated from their friends, it may also save some of the money that would have been used to add additional classrooms or mobiles and buy extra supplies for Harrisburg.

Dear Governor Haley:

I am an eighth grade student at Indian Land Middle School in Lancaster county and I am writing this letter to you about a need for more extracurricular activities in Lancaster County schools. Currently our school does not offer a large variety of sports or performing arts extracurricular activities. The sports that are offered are basic, like boy's football, basketball, and baseball and girl's cheer, basketball, volleyball, and dance. Many sports such as golf, swimming, soccer, track, cross country, softball, and lacrosse are not offered at our middle school, and some are not offered at Indian Land High School.

There are also not any artistic/performing arts extracurricular activities, like drama club or photography club, offered at our school. Because of this, and the limited number of sports offered, many students do not have an opportunity to join extracurricular activities. Having more school activities for students to join would help them be more active in their everyday life. This is especially important due to the rising rate of childhood obesity. The childhood obesity rate went from 7% to 18% during 1980 to 2012. If students are not involved with after school activities they may have a tendency to go home and do unhealthy activities like watching TV or playing video games. The students perform these actions instead of physical activity such as exercise.

In order to increase the number of extracurricular activities, additional funding would be required to pay for additional coaches, transportation, and facilities. However, due the rising cost of healthcare, averaging 6 % increase every year, this would be money well spent. Compared to schools elsewhere in South Carolina and in nearby North Carolina, Lancaster County school students do not have the same opportunities to participate in these kinds of activities. The average South Carolina teacher gets paid \$48,375. That's below the national average of \$56,103, which in my opinion is not enough either.

Several teachers have to work second jobs either after school or during the summer break.
