

17a. Operations – Public Assistance (PA): Approximately 175,061 cubic yards of debris have been removed from Anderson, Berkeley, Charleston, Clarendon, Dorchester, Georgetown, Greenwood, Horry, Lexington, Orangeburg, Richland, Sumter, and Williamsburg counties as well as the City of Columbia, Richland County. Thirty-two Kick-off Meetings were completed and nine (9) Requests for Public Assistance (RPAs). The Applicants' Briefing for Spartanburg County was completed on 11/18/2015. As of COB 11/19/2015 there are 58 Project Worksheets (PWs) entered in Enterprise Management Mission Integrated Environment (EMMIE) system and 17 PWs have been obligated for a federal share of \$12,622,887.

17b. Operations – Hazard Mitigation (HM):

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP): The Administrative Plan was approved and the 30-day \$36M Lock-in estimate has been received. State/FEMA HMGP team completed project scoping visits in Chester County on 11/18/2015 and Barnwell County on 11/19/2015.

Flood Recovery Office (FRO): Staff responded to National Flood Insurance Program congressional inquiries from the offices of U.S Senator Lindsey Graham, U.S. Senator Tim Scott, and Congressman Mark Sanford. Lessons-learned input was provided to the Federal Insurance and Mitigation Administration Operational and Analysis Evaluation assessment team.

Community Education and Outreach (CEO): Mitigation advisors staffed 29 DRCs, provided personal and property risk information to 235 survivors. The cumulative total is 9,278 individuals.
