I'd like to talk to Shwedo about work he's coordinating with nonprofits. I specifically want to know if _ and if so, how _ House bill 3568 (Act 69) will be helpful in the rebuilding effort. It gives sales tax exemptions, starting Jan. 1, for construction materials bought by nonprofits to build and repair homes. It also gives a tax break on clothing bought by charities to distribute to needy children. Obviously, the legislators didn't have the flood in mind when they passed this in June. But the timing appears to be interesting/helpful _ though perhaps not if nonprofits are trying to get the work done before Jan. 1. Perhaps the date it takes effect is actually irritatingly unhelpful in hindsight. Are nonprofits holding off on buying material until after the law takes effect to maximize donations? ... Frankly, I don't know what the story is yet....

I'd also like an update on the fundraising. How much has One SC collected? Where's the money going? What's the status of those 5,000 poor, elderly people identified by FEMA as needing help?
