McClatchy DC: Coastal cities rising up against Atlantic offshore drilling plans

As the Obama administration prepares to open the Atlantic Ocean to oil and gas drilling for the first time in decades, the coast is in rebellion. More than 70 cities and counties in the Carolinas, Georgia and Florida have passed resolutions opposing oil exploration or drilling off their coasts, pushing the president to reverse course and keep drilling rigs from the Eastern seaboard.

Note: All four U.S. senators from North and South Carolina support drilling, though, as does South Carolina Republican Gov. Nikki Haley.

Note: “Governor Haley believes offshore exploration should be done in a way that protects, and never compromises, our environment, our ports and tourism industry,” said Haley spokeswoman Chaney Adams. “But as she has worked with members of the congressional delegation and the General Assembly on this critical economic development issue, she’s also been clear: Exploring offshore for energy is critical to our future because it means jobs, energy independence from other countries and security for our state.”

A law passed this year in South Carolina will give wild turkeys a leg up next year as concerned wildlife officials and hunters say low reproduction rates are leading to harvest declines. An October report by deer and wild turkey program coordinator Charles Ruth, with the state Department of Natural Resources, found the spring season harvest was down 6 percent from last year to 15,200 and 40 percent from the 2002 record-high season.
