One of the nation's oldest public housing projects stands just 2 miles from the convention center where Republican presidential candidates on Saturday will deliver their prescriptions for poverty. It is a topic rarely addressed on the campaign trail and one that Gonzales Gardens residents suspect that most of the White House contenders know or care little about.

**Note:** Most of the other GOP candidates have opposed increasing the number of poor people eligible for Medicaid insurance under Mr. Obama's Affordable Care Act. So did South Carolina Gov. Nikki Haley, a potential vice-presidential candidate.

The Jack Kemp Foundation is holding a forum on Saturday at the Columbia Metropolitan Convention Center, moderated by House Speaker Paul Ryan and U.S. Sen. Tim Scott.

**Note:** After remarks by Gov. Nikki Haley and U.S. Sen. Lindsey Graham, Ohio Gov. John Kasich and Florida Sen. Marco Rubio are taking part in a third panel.

Congressional supporters of the nation's MOX project hinted that they might attempt to appropriate money so the Department of Energy can pay a multimillion-dollar fine to South Carolina for missing a key MOX milestone.

**Note:** S.C. Gov. Nikki Haley informed U.S. Energy Secretary Ernest Moniz last month that South Carolina intends to collect the money. The move was applauded by members of the state's congressional delegation, including U.S. Rep. Joe Wilson, R-S.C., who said he would support a federal appropriation to ensure DOE paid the fines.

**Note:** Moniz, nor the Energy Department, has responded to Haley's letter, which was sent out Dec. 14. U.S. Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C., also praised Haley for attempting to levy the fines and for threatening to sue if DOE refuses to pay.
