Gov. Nikki Haley's veto has killed legislation exempting teacher evaluations from public disclosure, but the Republican governor said she will support a better-written bill next year. Haley said she recognizes the bill's intent is to promote a more candid evaluation process, but she said it is too broad. The one-sentence measure exempts educator evaluations with "personally identifiable information" from the state's Freedom of Information Act. Haley said that allows school districts to withhold any record related to an evaluation, including information on teacher misconduct that should be publicly available, she wrote in her veto message signed Friday.

South Carolina's governor says a Chinese fiberglass manufacturer is expected to create 400 jobs when it opens a manufacturing operation in Richland County. Gov. Nikki Haley said in a news release Tuesday that China Jushi also is expected to invest \$300 million in the 80,000-ton production line during the first phase. The plant will be the company's first fiberglass manufacturing operation in the U.S. The plant will be located in Pineview Industrial Park in Columbia. Officials say the company expects to begin construction in the fourth quarter of 2016 and complete the facility within two years.

Greenville News: Senate passes budget with \$216 million for roads

The Senate has given its final approval of a \$7.5 billion General Fund budget that would enable the state to borrow \$2.3 billion for roads, grant state employees a 3.25 percent pay raise and adds \$10 million to the appropriation of local governments. House and Senate negotiators reached a compromise on Saturday, leaving final approval to both chambers. The Senate on Tuesday voted 36-9 to approve the compromise. That leaves House approval before the budget is sent to Gov. Nikki Haley.

Note: "What we did in the appropriations bill does not fix the roads," Senate President Pro Tempore Hugh Leatherman told the Senate. "It certainly begins to fix the roads in our state. Next year, I'll be at the forefront, we've got to find a continuing stream of money if we're going to fix the roads in this state."

The South Carolina Legislature's \$7.5 billion spending plan for next fiscal year is one vote from Gov. Nikki Haley's desk. Senators voted 36-9 Tuesday to approve the budget compromise reached over the weekend by a panel of Senate and House members. House approval would send the package to Haley, who has the authority to veto specific items. Spending she might strike could include the \$40 million of aid to farmers whose crops were wiped out by last October's catastrophic flooding. The Legislature already overrode Haley's veto of legislation setting up how that aid will be distributed.

Members from the S.C. House and Senate reached a preliminary agreement on legislation that creates an independent investigations panel when lawmakers are accused of wrongdoing. The House and Senate earlier this year passed different versions of the bill regulating a state ethics commission and representatives from each chamber agreed Tuesday on a compromise they all could agree to. Senators agreed to almost all of the changes proposed by the House of Representatives, giving the eight-member commission the ability to move an investigation forward instead of referring it to each chamber's ethics committee. Those committees would then decide to make the information publicly available.

Larry Prater spent 11 years in prison on a charge of assault with intent to kill. The Spartanburg native now lives in Roebuck, working as a forklift operator in Duncan and preparing to move into a place of his own next month. The halfway house he shares with another former inmate is in a trailer park off Bearden Road, not far from where the community gathered in 2014 to voice their anger about ex-offenders being nearby. In an

effort to address such community concerns, the General Assembly has passed a bill requiring groups that help rehabilitate ex-offenders to post public notices before halfway houses open. Signs must be posted on the property and a notice placed in a newspaper 60 days in advance. Groups also must host a public forum in the affected community at least 30 days before ex-convicts can move in. Gov. Nikki Haley is expected to sign the bill.

Under pressure from Congress to reduce federal dollars spent on emergency aid, the Federal Emergency Management Agency is floating a new proposal that would give states a financial incentive to better prepare for storms, floods, hurricanes and other disasters. Some state and local officials are pushing back. Many of the 150 public comments filed to the agency express concern that the proposed changes would just shift the financial and administrative burden to local governments already overloaded during disaster situations.

Note: "The question for us is manpower," South Carolina Emergency Management Division chief of recovery and mitigation Elizabeth Ryan said in an interview.

Note: "For these communities it may affect their ability to recover from an event because they flat out don't have the money," South Carolina Emergency Management director Kim Stenson said, pointing out that there already is a 25-percent cost share for the communities. "Even with that cost share, sometimes that's very onerous, especially for some small counties in South Carolina," he said.

This is South Carolina, never an exemplar of robust public services, now a commonwealth in which any notion of the public good and a structure to support it has withered to the point of collapse. "South Carolina's state government is on life support," reads the lead paragraph of an extraordinary story in Saturday's The State newspaper, and before you cheer and urge Nikki Haley to go ahead and pull the plug already, you might want to consider that what citizens save through non-investment in the public sector tends to come back later and exact a profound cost through dam failures, crumbling schools, unsafe bridges, and dying children. After the political convention confetti is swept away, a more sobering tradition of the presidential election begins: The regular, top-secret intelligence briefings for Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton, the likely Democratic nominee. Started by President Harry S. Truman, the briefings are designed to get the candidates, before they walk into the Oval Office, up to speed on problems around the globe. Truman, who was Franklin D. Roosevelt's vice president for almost three months before Roosevelt died, first learned about the Manhattan Project to develop an atomic bomb only 12 days into his presidency, and he pledged not to leave any future commander in chief behind the ball.

Clinton heads into California and the other end-of-the-line primaries June 7 with the Democratic nomination virtually locked up — she needs just 71 delegates to reach the required threshold at the party's summer convention in Philadelphia. But Sanders is staging boisterous rallies across the state and running TV ads in hopes of delivering an upset that he says would strengthen his claim to the nomination, despite the numbers.

Associated Press: Mediterranean Sea disasters swallow up over 1,000 migrants

The treacherous Mediterranean Sea crossing from Libya to Italy has claimed the lives of over 1,030 migrants in the last week, mostly as barely seaworthy smuggling boats foundered and sank despite calm seas and sunny skies, a migration agency said Tuesday, citing new accounts from survivors. The staggering death toll foreshadows more disasters ahead in the next few months as the region gears up for its traditional summer-fall spike in human trafficking as the weather improves and the seas grow warmer. Aid officials said it also suggests that Libyan smuggling gangs are using even riskier tactics than before to profit from the torrent of those desperate to reach the safety or economic promise of Europe.

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
