Dear Ms. McNicoll:

This letter is in response to your request for the state and federal motor fuel taxes collected for the last three years, distribution of the state motor fuel tax, and the amount of federal motor fuel tax South Carolina received for road funding and other programs.

South Carolina's motor fuel tax rate is \$0.16. Of the \$0.16 on gasoline, \$0.0266 is allocated to "C" funds for counties, \$0.1034 is allocated to the Department of Transportation (DOT) and \$0.03 is allocated to the State Highway Fund. Of the \$0.16 on diesel fuel, \$0.13 is allocated to DOT, and \$0.03 is allocated to the State Highway Fund. In addition to the current \$0.16 motor fuel tax rate, there is a \$0.0075 inspection and environmental impact fee. The revenue generated from the inspection and environmental impact fee is allocated to the Department of Health and Environmental Control, Department of Agriculture, and DOT. The enclosed table shows the state motor fuel revenue distributions from FY 2005-06 to FY 2015-16.

The federal gasoline tax rate is \$0.184, and the diesel tax rate is \$0.244. The table below shows our estimates of revenue generated from federal taxes on gasoline and diesel fuel. The estimates were calculated based on the number of gasoline and diesel gallons by year.

We have requested additional assistance in determining federal funding to South Carolina from DOT and will provide any information we receive from the agency. We were able to find some information on their website. Based upon data in DOTs Statewide Transportation Improvement Program report, \$646,000,000 in federal funds

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and \$119,000,000 in state funds were planned for highway funding in FY 2015-16, and \$51,000,000 in federal funds and \$6,000,000 in state funds were planned for mass transit funding. The Statewide Transportation Improvement Program report identifies all projects and program areas receiving federal funding, which includes bridge replacements, safety, roadway resurfacing, interstate maintenance and upgrades, primary and secondary road system upgrades, transportation alternatives, congestion mitigation and air quality, and public transportation. We have included a few select charts and tables from the report that may be helpful. Notes:

* The fees generated from the 0.75¢ inspection and environmental impact fees are estimates based upon motor fuel gallons.

- (1) Section 12-28-2740(A) directs the proceeds from 2.66¢ a gallon on the user fee of gasoline to "C" funds.
- (2) Section 12-28-2720 directs the proceeds from 10.34¢ a gallon of the user fee on gasoline to the Department of Transportation. Of the 10.34¢, 0.25¢ is allocated to mass transit pursuant to Section 12-28-2725, and 1% of 13¢ is allocated to the Department of Natural Resources pursuant to Section 12-28-2730(A).

- (3) Section 12-28-2355(A) allows a 0.25¢ per gallon inspection fee to be imposed on petroleum products. The allocation of the 0.25¢ is as follows:

10% is allocated to the Department of Agriculture, beginning in FY 2004-05.

The remaining 90% is allocated as follows:

- FY 2004-05: 60% was allocated to the General Fund and 40% was allocated to the State Non-Federal Aid Highway Fund
- FY 2005-06: 20% was allocated to the General Fund and 80% was allocated to the State Non-Federal Aid Highway Fund
- FY 2006-07 and each year thereafter, 100% is allocated to the State Non-Federal Aid Highway Fund.

- (4) Section 12-28-2355(B) allows a 0.50¢ per gallon environmental impact fee to be imposed on petroleum products. The funds from the 0.50¢ are allocated to the Department of Health and Environmental Control.
- (5) Section 12-28-2910(C) allocates the first \$18 million generated from the 3¢ user fee as follows (not included in the table):

In FY 2005-06, \$12 million was allocated for economic development and \$6 million was credited to the State Non-Federal Aid Highway Fund.

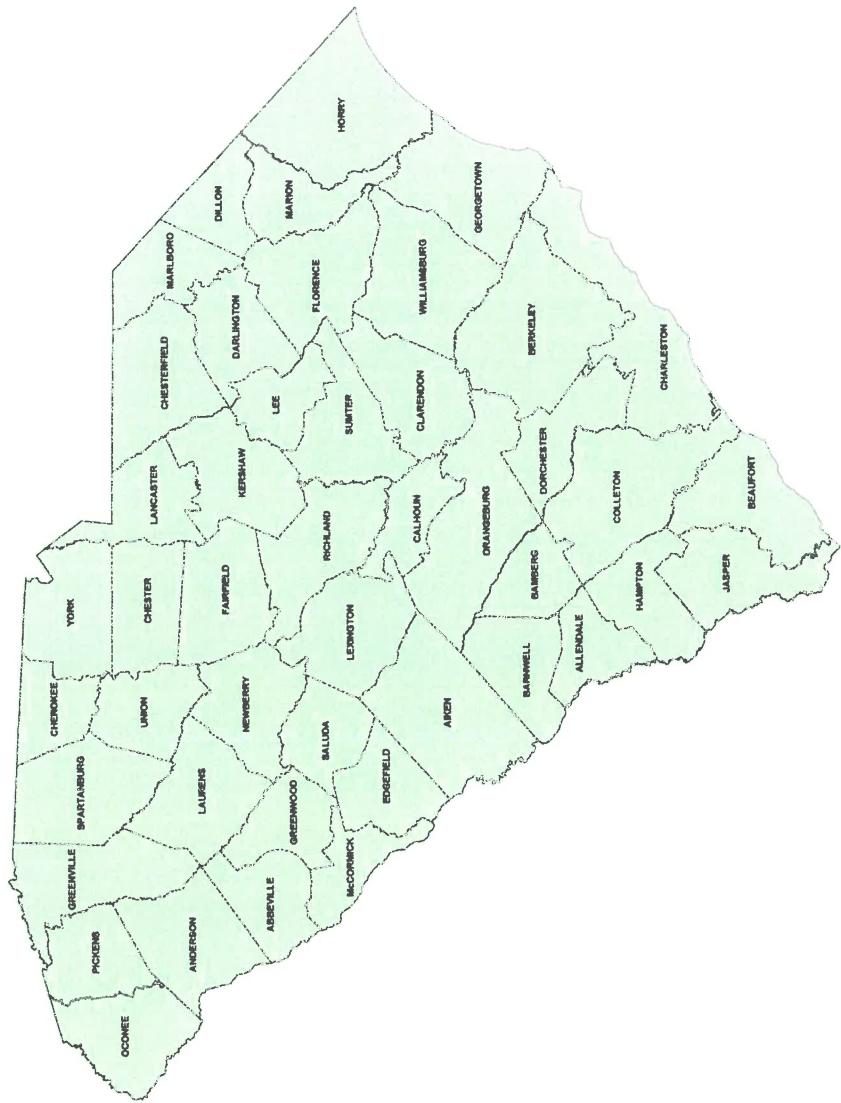
In FY 2006-07, \$6 million was allocated for economic development and \$12 million was credited to the State Non-Federal Aid Highway Fund.

Beginning in FY 2007-08 and each succeeding fiscal year, the first \$18 million must be credited to the State Non-Federal Aid Highway Fund.

Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP)

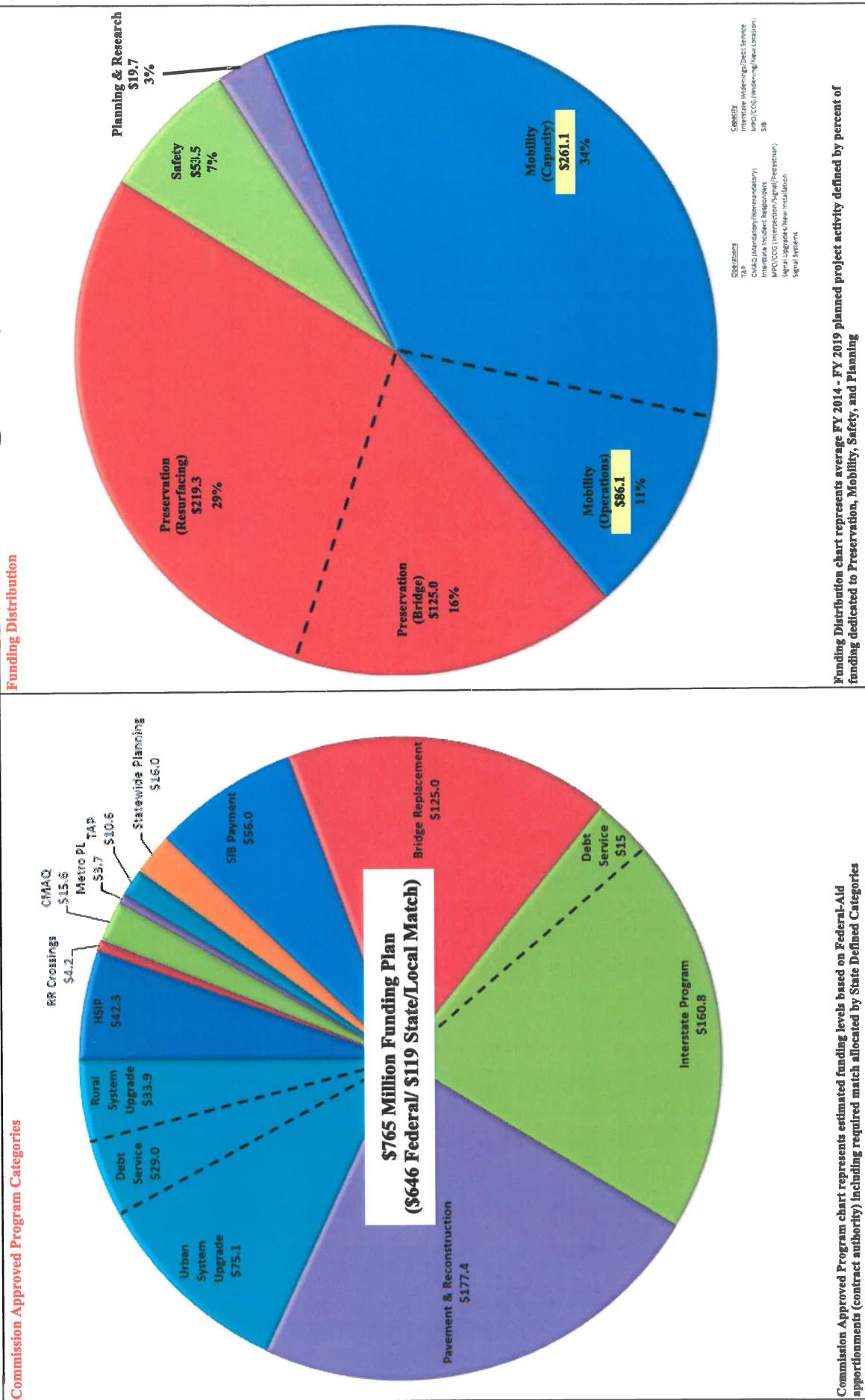
The South Carolina Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) is the State's six-year transportation improvement program for all projects and program areas receiving federal funding, including bridge replacements, safety, roadway resurfacing, interstate maintenance and upgrades, primary and secondary road system upgrades, transportation alternatives, congestion mitigation and air quality, and public transportation. The STIP covers all federally funded improvements for which funding has been approved and that are expected to be undertaken during the upcoming six-year period. The document is generally scheduled for updating every three years and is revised on a continual basis to reflect the latest program and project information. The South Carolina Department of Transportation Commission, as well as the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit Administration (FTA) approve the STIP.

To provide a document that is user-friendly and streamlined, the STIP is formatted to include summaries of statewide programming, as well as project information by county. In addition, regional project tables are included to account for multi-jurisdictional projects.

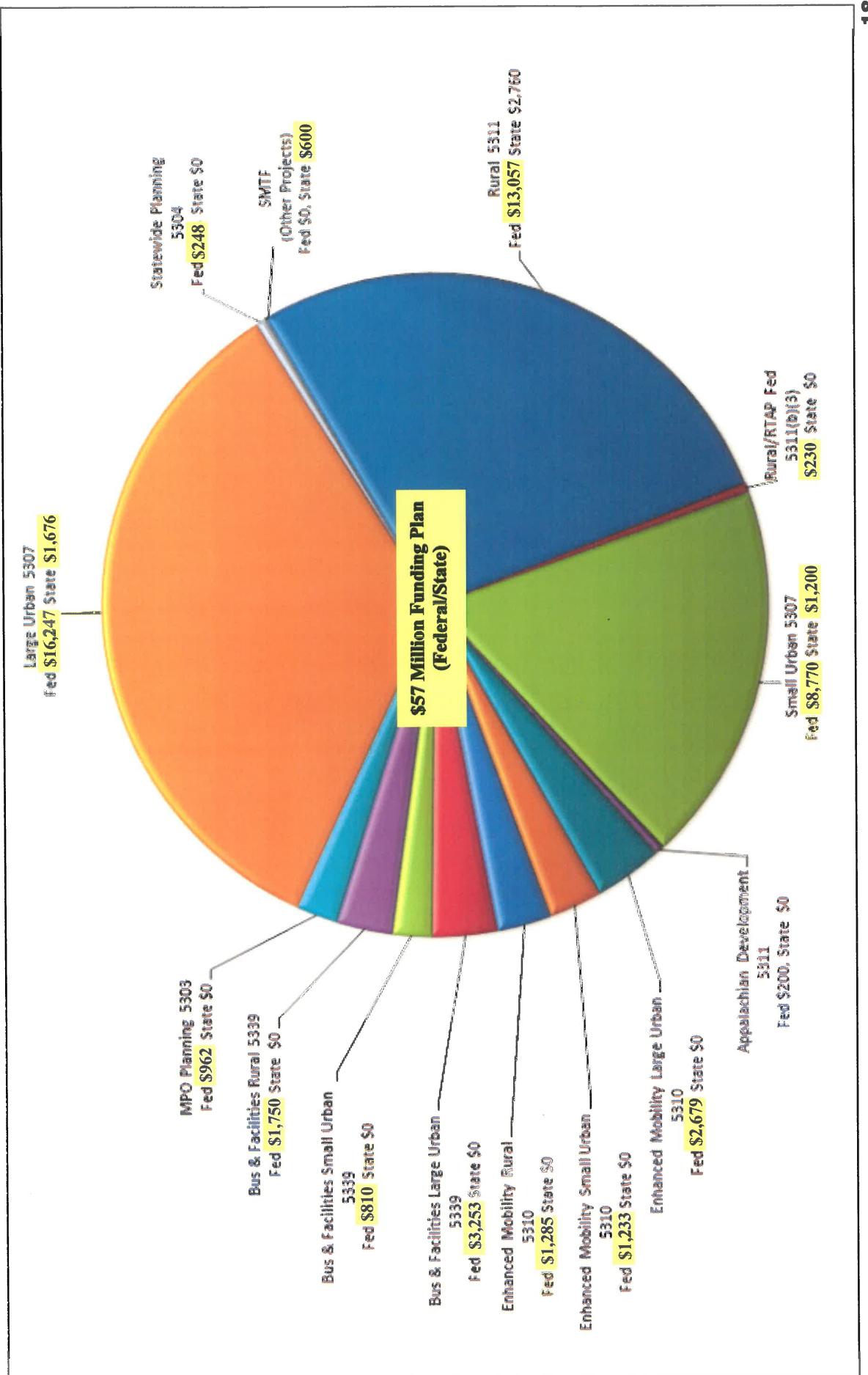

Fiscal Year 2016 Mass Transit Funding Plan

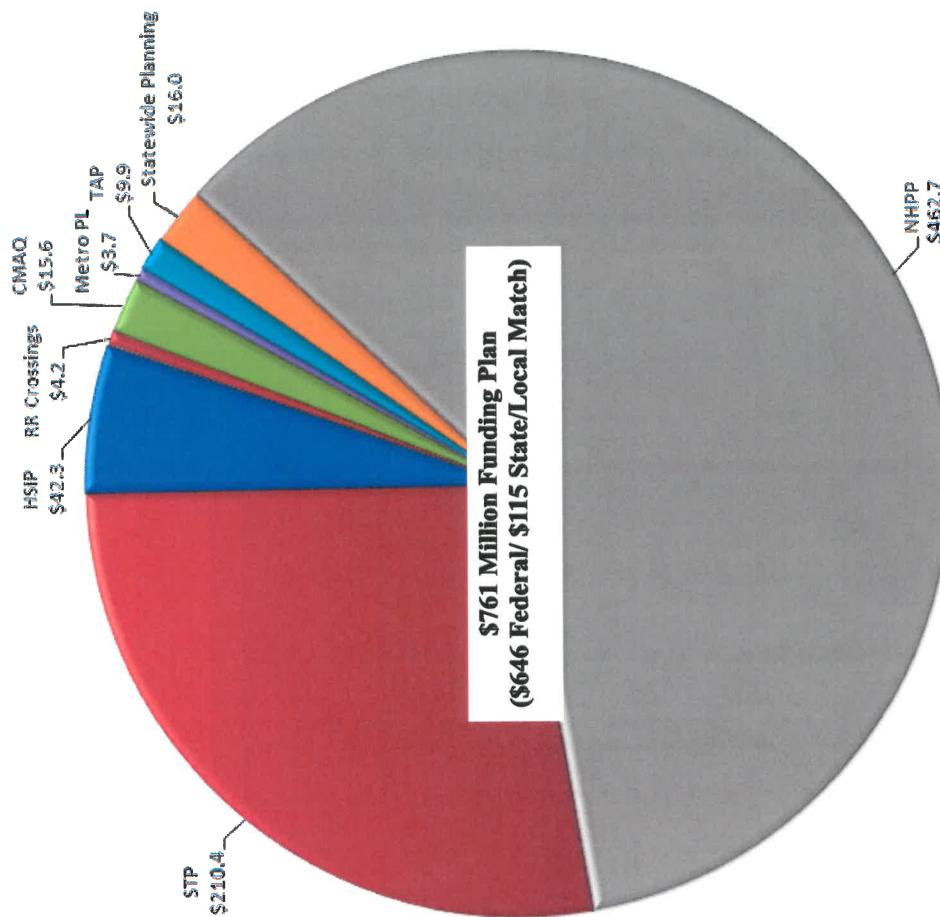
