Dear Christine Isaiah,

Because you are the guardian of my three children, Eunice Isaiah, Javan Isaiah and Noah Isaiah, I am writing to you. Also you often watch my daughters Lois and Ruth Isaiah.

It is the holiday season and we miss our children. We have not seen them for almost twenty-five months. We want to have contact with our children, but we are frustrated because you said, "Don't come near my house", when you appeared angry and accused us of calling DSS concerning allegations of sexual abuse in your house. These allegations may be true, but we did not call DSS to investigate your house, and we were hoping for some kind of an apology.

You seem to be using being angry as an excuse to keep us from seeing our children. In the past you have cancelled visits and prevented telephone conversa-

tions. Now you have a son that you seem to agitate who has confronted us on more than one occasion saying "Don't come near my house and don't call your daughter!" He has custody of our 8-year old! Even though his wife says to disregard her husband's attitude, we will not be bullied. We avoid trouble with you and your sons, but we do love our children.


Two to three families have called us concerning allegations of criminal sexual abuse committed on minors in your same house in the past years. Where are these people getting our number from? We are not the ones who called DSS, but maybe one of these people did, seeing that they said they were harmed in your household.

We are not happy with the visitation situation. We want to know how our children are doing in school: How they are developing, How is the separation affecting their character? How do they feel about it?


We are sure that we the parents

can offer something positive to better their lives. You have systematically tried to lock us out. God is not pleased with this either. We also want to have our children back with us and know for a fact that some of the children have expressed a desire to see us and be with us. We know in our hearts that they may suffer grief at times when denied access to us.

What can you do, Christine, to help this situation to be improved and help us have good visitation with our children? If we need structured visitation then so be it, so that the children will have an opportunity to share their love with their parents if they so choose to. Give them a chance.
