Governor Nikki Haley News:

Associated Press: Haley announces Dept. of Administration secretary

Gov. Nikki Haley says the director of the agency that handles much of state government's bureaucracy will be South Carolina's first Department of Administration secretary. Haley announced Thursday that Marcia Adams will lead the agency that officially won't exist until July 1. It will be South Carolina's 17th Cabinet agency.

Note: But Haley says she wanted to make the announcement early to help with the transition. She called Adams' appointment a "no-brainer."

Marcia Adams, head of the soon-to-close agency that oversees S.C. state government operations, was named Thursday to lead its successor that will go under control of Gov. Nikki Haley. Haley appointed Adams as the first director of the Department of Administration.

Note: "This is the one position that I am not the slightest bit nervous about," Haley said. "I have seen her in action. I know what she thinks. We're looking at a good finance person that understands this all about making the lives of every agency easier and reducing the dollars of every taxpayers in South Carolina."

The Administration Department was created as a result of a government restructuring bill passed this most recent legislative session.

More than 26 ethics reform bills have already been prefiled by legislators in both the state House of Representatives and the Senate for the upcoming 2015-2016 session. Ethics reform has taken a front and center position at the beginning of each session since 2012- and even with so much talk about changing laws.

Note: "We still have an F on the corruption risk report card," Governor Nikki Haley said. "We are still 45th state in the country when it comes to corruption. In my administration time, we have watched a Lt. Governor get indicted, we've watched a speaker get indicted, we've watched a senator get indicted, and I have removed 8 sheriffs."

Note: "It means every complaint goes to a second body that has no conflict. That body looks at it, decides what is wrong, and makes the judgement," said Haley.

The company's plan is part of an agreement in principle with the Southern Environmental Law Center, which has been pushing Duke for years to clean up the unlined, leaky ash dumps at the W.S. Lee facility near Greenville.

The \$237 million project to extend S.C. 31 to about S.C. 707 has been a multi-year project funded mostly by State Infrastructure Bank Funds, and in part with American Recovery and Investment Act Funds and local match dollars. The nearly four-mile extension will be a multi-lane highway that includes a bridge over the Atlantic Intracoastal Waterway. Construction is slated to be completed by the spring of 2017.
