However, there was some isolated flooding, a few downed trees, and sporadic power outages. Jasper's EOC will return to normal operations this morning and released our regional emergency manager.

Subject: EMD Update - TS Colin

TS Colin is nearing landfall along Florida's western coast.

Forecast: Colin is predicted to remain a tropical storm as it moves along our coast later tonight and tomorrow. However, the storm will be moving quickly and is expected to move past our coast around mid-day tomorrow.

Effects on SC: A tropical storm warning is now in effect for our entire coast. Rainfall potential varies significantly by location. The highest amounts will be along the coast and gradually taper off moving inland. Rain is currently falling throughout most of the state. A flash flood watch in effect through most of the state (except for the area from Anderson to York) until sometime tomorrow. Minor coastal flooding is expected with the late evening high tides through mid-week. Wind gusts up to 40-50 mph along the immediate coastal areas with the highest gusts in rain bands. Isolated tornadoes are also possible.

- In the Beaufort/Charleston area, rainfall projections are from 4-8 inches with locally heavier amounts possible.
- In the Georgetown/Horry area, rainfall projections from 4-5 inches along the coast with 1-3 inches further west.
- In the Midlands, heavy rain is also possible in portions of the Midlands and Upstate.

County Actions: We conducted a county conference call (with SERT representation) this afternoon to discuss county status and any planned activities. All counties remain at OPCON 5 and are not planning any specific activities other than keeping their EOC staffs informed with one exception. Jasper County is at OPCON 3 and partially staffed as a result of residual effects of last week's storm and possible weather effects over the next 24 hours.

State Actions: State agencies are standing by for possible county requests but no county unmet needs or capability gaps have been identified. EMD will have one of its regional emergency managers in the Jasper EOC to facilitate any possible requests as well as maintain situational awareness. EMD is not planning any SEOC staffing but have identified a small staff to operate the SEOC this evening if required.

Other State Actions: NC and GA EOCs are at steady state but the FL EOC is at a partial activation with a state of emergency. However, Florida's situation is a bit different as they are expecting a landfall sometime today with a very

high probability of tropical storm winds, surge, and associated rain.
