Ever wonder why we name some of our buildings and spaces the way we do? The beachfront store at Edisto Beach State Park that recently reopened is called the "Camp Exchange." It's not some name we dreamed up overnight. Here's the story:

Eleven men from a CCC Company stationed at Witherbee, SC in 1935 did a short detail at Edisto to establish the CCC camp at Edisto Beach -- what would become the state park. They laid out a campsite "one mile from the beach, on a Bluff of Scott Creek, in a wilderness of myrtle bushes and palmetto trees." They didn't stay long, and after they left, another CCC company arrived to build the park.

Most likely the company from Witherbee was Co. 5418, an African American crew that went on to do work on the Francis Marion National Forest. We believe this photo was taken at Witherbee and not at Edisto -- but naming the new store the "Camp Exchange" provided a tie to this company, and the past.

Mr. Henry Smith (center) is pictured here with two of his friends from the Witherbee Camp. We love how our parks are always looking to progress and move forward -- but preserve and honor their history. This photo and plaque now hangs on the Camp Exchange at Edisto Beach explaining this tie to history!
